### Daring Feat Performed by Amethyst.

The Cable in the Dardanelles Amid Veritable Hail of Fire.

London, March 19.—"The casualties reported sustained on the British cruiser Amethyst were the result of a smart piece of work which she performed in the Dardanelles when, it is stated, she was entrusted with the difficult task of cutting the telegraph cable connecting Kild Bahr with Chanak," says the Malta correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Company. "The correspondent continues: 'She succeeded in lifting and cutting the cable undetected and had started on her return journey when she was discovered. She then had to run the gauntlet of forts on both sides of the Narrows, becoming the target of a veritable hail of fire. Going at full speed, although frequently hit, she succeeded in getting beyond the range of the guns and reaching the entrance to the Straits'."

### FRENCH SUBMARINE BOAT LOST IN DARDANELLES.

London, March 19.—The loss of a French submarine boat in an attempt to run through the Dardanelles is described by Rear-Admiral Guépratte, of the French Dardanelles fleet, in an interview with the Daily Telegraph's Tenedos correspondent. The attempt apparently was made some time ago, although no announcement has been made of it heretofore. "The attempt had as its object, the sinking of the Turkish cruiser Sultan Selim (formerly the German cruiser Goeben)," the correspondent says. Rear-Admiral Guépratte told him. "The submarine was submerged, and successfully navigated the Straits up to the corner where the Asiatic coast juts out at Nagara.

"Through some miscalculation, which is quite natural when a submarine is trying to thread a tortuous channel without the aid of a periscope, the hull struck the rocky shore, compelling the boat to rise to the surface. Immediately the submarine appeared the forts opened fire, sinking her. Only a few of the crew escaped, and those were made prisoners. "Regarding the present situation in the Dardanelles, Rear-Admiral Guépratte said the waters of the Straits were clear as far as Kephez Berru, to which point all vessels of the fleet can safely navigate. The main mine fields, however, are between Chanak Kalesi and Kild Bahr, where also are the main coast defenses. "When these are removed the rest will be easy, although the assistance of land forces will be needed. For the final success of the undertaking, there is not a shadow of doubt. The French fleet has far surpassed no casualties."

### From the Firing Line.

Mrs. Hart, of Henry Street, has recently received letters and postcards from her son, Sergt. William Hart, now at the front with the Princess Pats. Besides the regulation postcards which come from the firing line Mrs. Hart has received a letter from Rouen, dated March 6th, and duly passed by the censor. In his letter "Will" says that he is enjoying excellent health, and that up to the time of writing he had been two nights on the firing line and had found it "very exciting." Sergeant Hart is with the 90th Brigade, 27th Division of the British Expeditionary Force of which the Princess Patricia's Light Infantry forms a part.


