**War News.**

Messages Received Previous to 9 a.m.

**OFFICIAL.**

LONDON, May 13. The Governor, Newfoundland: In the Dardanelles the battleship Goliath was torpedoed and sunk. Over five hundred men were lost. Two Turkish gunboats and a large Turkish transport have been sunk by submarine E-14.

General French reports that a fresh German attack east of Ypres on the Menin Road, has been repulsed. No change elsewhere.

The French Government report fighting north of Arras continued with extreme violence. German losses in attacking Neuville and St. Vaast were particularly heavy. Progress east of Carency is continued, and the last German communication with this place is being threatened.

This afternoon's report announces brilliant successes. A violent counter-attack on Notre Dame de Lorette was repulsed with extremely heavy losses. Carency was carried by assault. Hundreds were bayoneted and over 1,000 prisoners were taken. There has been appreciable progress north of Neuville. The total number of prisoners captured since Sunday is 4,000.

The Russian Government reports continued retreat in Western Galicia. In Eastern Galicia in the region of Jaworuk, the enemy left over 4,000 dead.

In the Trans-Dniester region the Russians took the offensive on a front of over forty miles, inflicting heavy loss on the enemy. On the 10th inst., alone, over 5,000 prisoners were taken with 6 guns and 8 machine guns.

General Botha's forces have occupied Windhoek.

**BRITISH BATTLESHIP GOLIATH SUNK BY TORPEDO.**

LONDON, May 13. The British battleship Goliath has been torpedoed in the Dardanelles. It is feared that 500 lives were lost. The announcement of the loss of the Goliath was made in the House of Commons this afternoon by Churchill. While no definite information is apparently received as to the number of lives lost, Churchill said he feared it would reach 500.

**BRITISH SUBMARINE PENETRATES DARDANELLES.**

LONDON, May 13. Mr. Churchill announced in the Commons that the British submarine E-14 had penetrated through the Dardanelles and into the Sea of Marmora, sinking two Turkish gunboats and a Turkish transport. The Goliath was one of the older British battleships of pre-Dreadnought type, built in 1898, complement of 750 men. Twenty officers and 160 men of the Goliath's crew were saved.

**WILL SEND BRITISH AND FRENCH SUBJECTS INTO THE WAR ZONE.**

LONDON, May 13. According to advices reaching here from Constantinople, the Turkish authorities are threatening to send into the war zone on the Gallipoli Peninsula, all British and French subjects in Turkey.

**MERELY A PRECAUTION.**

WASHINGTON, May 13. A special guard of plain clothes policemen was placed to-day about the German Embassy. The officials said it was merely a precaution.

**ALIEN ENEMIES WILL BE INTERNED.**

LONDON, May 13. Premier Asquith announced in the Commons to-day that all male enemies over military age will be repatriated. He also said that women and children in suitable cases will be repatriated, though some might remain. The Government proposes to segregate all adult male enemies for their own safety and for the safety of the country. Announcing the alien policy of the Government, the Premier said: "At this moment some 2,000 unassimilated aliens, of whom 2,000 are men, are at large in this country. The Government proposes that all adult males of this class should, for their own safety and that of the country, be segregated or interned. If over military age, they should be repatriated. The Government recognizes there may be cases calling for exceptional treatment. Women and children form suitable cases which justice and humanity may require that they be allowed to remain. An official body of a judicial character will be set up to deal with claims for exemption, and as soon as military and naval authorities have provided necessary accommodations, those who have not secured exemption will be interned. 

naturalized aliens, who in law are British subjects, numbering 8,000, the prima facie presumption should be on the other way, but exceptional cases established to the satisfaction of the advising body, will be specially dealt with. There must be powers of internment in cases of proved necessity or danger." He mentioned incidentally that 15,000 non-naturalized alien enemies had already been interned in Britain. Bonar Law said he welcomed the Premier's statement, as the country was so aroused it was liable to get out of hand.

**WILL BE STRUCK OFF THE ROLL.**

LONDON, May 13. The King, as Sovereign of the Order of the Garter, says an official announcement, issued this evening, has given directions that the following names be struck off the roll of Knights of the Order: The Emperor of Austria, the German Emperor, the King of Wuerttemberg, the Grand Duke of Hesse, Prince Henry of Prussia, the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha and the Duke of Cumberland. The Order of the Garter was constituted by King Edward III. about August, 1348. Since 1831 it has consisted of the British Sovereign and 25 Knight Companions, who were lineal descendants of King George I. and of Knights who have been admitted by special statutes.

**AGITATION INCREASES.**

ROME, May 13. An urgent council of ministers was convened this afternoon, owing to alarming increase in the agitation of the people.

**FRENCH SUCCESSES.**

PARIS, via St. Pierre, May 13. North of Arras a brilliant success was secured on Tuesday and Wednesday nights. At Notre Dame de Lorette the Germans violently counter-attacked up in the large quadrilateral of works and trenches situated south of the Chapel. A desperate struggle which lasted all night, ended in this quadrilateral. In the morning we remained in entire possession, having inflicted exceedingly heavy losses on the enemy. During the night we also assaulted the entire village of Carency and the woods to the north of Hill 125. The garrison holding this village and wood was composed of a battalion of the 102nd Infantry, a battalion of the 136th, a battalion of Bavarian Chausseurs, and finally six companies of sappers, each 200 men strong. These troops had converted Carency and adjoining woods into a formidable redoubt. Although very much reduced by their losses in dead and prisoners of the last few days, they resisted most desperately all night in a labyrinth of blockhouses. This resistance was shattered at daybreak, and we were in full possession of the position. Our troops killed at the point of the bayonet hundreds of Germans and secured 1,050 prisoners, including 20 officers, of which there was a Colonel and the Commander of the Bavarian battalion. At the southern exit of Souches our positions were fiercely attacked by the enemy, but their attack remained fruitless. At Neuville our attacks on the village and north of it secured us a good advance. To the north we advanced a few hundred metres, capturing the road known as Chemin des Carrieres, running from Neuville to Givenchy. In the village we only occupied yesterday morning the southern part, the enemy then holding the northern and central, but we attacked at the end of the evening and captured the centre of the locality, house by house. The Germans were thrown back to the extreme northern part which we are now rushing. Our troops are full of vigor and tenacity. At Le Pretre wood we captured yesterday another line of German trenches.

**CONSIDERING CONSCRIPTION.**

LONDON, May 13. Viscount Haldane, speaking in the Lords, intimated the Government were considering the necessity of departing from the voluntary system of military enlistment, and resorting to universal service throughout the Kingdom.

**RUSSIANS HEAVY REVERSES.**

LONDON, May 13. The Austro-German offensive continues in Western Galicia, where they have driven back the Russians forty miles from their position. The German allies claim 350,000 prisoners, 69 guns and 55 machine guns.

**THE ITALIAN CABINET.**

LONDON, May 13. The Italian Cabinet has resigned. The King has not yet called upon
