Shoulder to Shoulder!

The dark cloud of the Sinn Fein rebellion has its silver lining. It has brought us to the realization that we are all in this together. The Nationalist party has repudiated and denounced the Sinn Feiners who are responsible for the outbreak. It has also brought to John Redmond and his colleagues the sympathy and support of the Irish over the seas. It is an astounding circumstance that any person living under the British flag, should assail that flag and the free institution under which they live and accept aid from the Huns of civilization. These Huns are the enemies of free institutions and every other form of political freedom. They have brought up their people under their system of education to the belief that all other people are fit for nothing but servile positions and that all countries and their inhabitants should be heists of the Kaiser and the Prussian Junkers. It is had enough that the Sinn Feiners should have hindered recruiting for the flag, but that they should enlist volunteers, receive arms and other aid from Germany and keep back from the front soldiers into the hands of the enemy. But worst of all is the actual overt rebellion and the outbreak of fighting. All parts of the Empire are striving with might and main to bring the war to a successful conclusion by raising men and money, so far as their resources will permit. It is a disgrace that after 21 months of war, any body of men should be found within the confines of the Empire who should attempt to cripple or even hamper the fighting forces of the Empire at such a time and on such an occasion, when the Empire is struggling to protect the Enemy of Civilization to protect and insure the continuance of Freedom throughout the world. It was bad enough to have to fight the irreconcilable portion of the Boers, but that there should be rebellion at the heart
