Redmond's Speech.

Marks New Stage in Irish War History.

The Montreal Star Office, 17 Cockspur Street, London, Oct. 7.—Mr. Redmond's speech in Waterford last night is likely to mark another stage in Ireland's somewhat melancholy war history.

Will he line up with Sir Edward Carson and accept conscription for Ireland? That is most unlikely, but it has been publicly announced that three Irish divisions at the front need men to fill the gaps caused by their heroism in the face of the enemy of Ulstermen and Nationalists alike.

It is also said that there are 200,000 available men in Ireland—Lord Wimborne says 100,000—but at the present rate of recruiting it will take five years to bring these to the colors.

The Nationalist objections to conscription, as expressed by Devlin Dillon in the Freeman's Journal, and other spokesmen, are as strong as ever.

Many resolutions denouncing it have been passed at Irish Nation League meetings in various parts of the country, yet men must be recruited with English and Scottish recruits.

The only immediate alternative to conscription seems to be a new recruiting campaign backed by Redmond and other leading Irishmen, based on the splendid deeds of Irish fighters at the front.

An Irishman writing in the Times says that Ireland generally has already done quite as well—and perhaps better—than Canada in recruiting.

New York, Oct. 10.—The New York Herald this morning in its leading editorial, under the caption, "This is a time for action not for 'weasel words,'" says, "Even the most pusillanimous pacifist cannot find excuse for delay on the part of the government of the United States in bringing Prussianism to an immediate account for the sinking of the Red Cross liner Stephano, plying between St. John's and New York."

"We are all Americans on this side of the Atlantic. The Stephano was engaged in peaceful commerce between two American ports. Her international status was just as clearly that of an American vessel engaged in American coastwise trade as if she were of American registry and flew the flag of the United States."

"She bore no relation to the conflict in Europe. The lives of Americans were placed in jeopardy by the crime of this agent of Prussian 'frightfulness.'"

A Comparison.

An official report comparing British with German agriculture, published by the British Government, shows that on each hundred acres—

1. The British farmer feeds from 45 to 50 persons, the German farmer feeds from 70 to 75.

2. The British farmer grows 11 tons of grain, the German farmer grows 33 tons.

3. The British farmer grows 11 tons of potatoes, the German farmer grows 55 tons.

4. The British farmer grows 4 tons of meat, the German farmer produces 4 1/2 tons.

5. The British farmer produces 17 1/2 tons of milk, the German farmer produces 28 tons.

6. The British farmer produces a negligible quantity of sugar, the German farmer produces 2 1/2 tons.

It is further stated in the report that the soil and climatic conditions in Germany are inferior to those in England.

A SUGGESTION TO NEUTRALS.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—Neutral nations are offered the suggestion that they use the German ships interned in their ports to compensate them for submarine losses by the shipping correspondent of the Times. Discussing the world shortage in tonnage, the correspondent says: In view of the continued destruction of neutral shipping, British owners are wondering how much longer neutral countries are going to allow German vessels to idle in their ports. After stating that there are ninety German ships in Chilean harbors, the correspondent continued: While like all neutrals she is suffering from lack of tonnage, therefore, in view of British ships, Chile, if she will not use the ships to export her produce to Europe, will be asked to lease them, a power which can employ them, which will indemnify her for loss of port and harbor charges.

A SUCCESSFUL RAID.

LONDON, Oct. 15.—A successful raid has been made on the Mauser works at Oberndorf and a large number of British and French naval aeroplanes dropped explosives on rifle works in Wurtemberg. The French aeroplanes dropped tons of explosives. Six German aeroplanes were brought down. The British aeroplanes failed to return according to British and French reports.

BRITISH GAINS.

LONDON, Oct. 15 (Official).—Further reports show that the prizes undertaken yesterday in the neighborhood of Staff Redoubt, highly successful. North of Staff Redoubt two lines of enemy communication trenches were cleared for a distance of nearly 200 yards. Near 200 prisoners were taken in the course of these operations, which were carried out by a single company. Schwaben redoubt, our gains were greater and our line advanced northwest of the redoubt. Huge losses were inflicted on the enemy. Total prisoners taken in both sections, including those reported last night, is 2 officers and 303 of all ranks. During the night the enemy trenches were entered and the north of Rockingham, and north of Festubert. North of Neuve Chapelle a number of prisoners were taken. Considerable damage was done to enemy defences.

FRENCH SUCCESS.

PARIS, Oct. 15 (Official).—South of the Somme we made attacks, which succeeded in capturing one on Santerres, which put us in possession of the German line of front of more than two kilometers. The other placed us in possession of the hamlet of Cenermont and surrounding area. 200 metres N.E. of the court. We took a large number of prisoners. Up to the present 8,000 unwounded prisoners, including seventeen officers, have been taken back.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.

PARIS, Oct. 15.—An official issued this afternoon by the French war department. Last night south of the River Somme the enemy attempted several attacks against the positions which we had taken possession of in the course of the day. The fire of our batteries dispersed some before they could reach our lines. All the other were broken up by our infantry, which maintained and consolidated its gains.

FINED AND IMPRISONED.

PARIS, Oct. 15.—William Chester Silberman, of New York, has been sentenced to the Correctional Court to five years in prison and five hundred francs as a charge of trading with the enemy. Silberman, according to the report, came to Paris, armed with papers describing him as a representative of the Knight Rubber Co. The strength of these papers he is finding.
