## The Baltic Situation.

The predicament of the Russian fleet is more regrettable than surprising. It is what might have been expected if it ventured to accept battle with the greatly stronger German ships, far outranging its guns and outweighing their projectiles. In addition to being bottled up in the narrow waters of Moon Sound, whence they cannot escape to the Gulf of Finland, the Russian ships have lost a valuable aid through the silencing of the shore beattleries on the Island and on the mainland. What proportion of the mainland. What proportion of the feapital Russian navy is thus cut off we are not informed. The chief protection of the Filand Gulf, which the Germans have not yet dared to tempt, is the field of mines and, probably, the Russian submarine fleet. An attempt to force an entrance would certainly involve the loss of a number of ships, and this the Germans are probably not anxious to risk.
