## A Simple and Inexpensive Preventive.

Counting accidents, or near accidents are of quite common occurrence, and must of necessity continue to be so owing to the hilly character of our streets. We have been exceptionally fortunate so far that no fatality has resulted, considering the extent to which coasting is indulged in by the irrepressible small boys. The accident at the junction of Brierley's Hill and New Gower Street referred to in Saturday's evening papers points the necessity for instituting some protective procedure that would insure safety alike to the small boy and to pedestrians without depriving the boys of the healthy sport and excitement that coasting furnishes. This would appear to be not at all difficult—would cost nothing, in fact an effective preventive of accidents may be provided and an economy at the same time attained in the cost of other services. If the city council would instruct its inspector to have one of his sergeants collect a load of clean sheet material—especially after each fall of snow—and to spread this over a wedge-shaped area at the foot of, say, Brierley's Hill, leaving about 8 feet on either side, free of all the passing of teams would not be at all interfered with by this and an effective arrestor of the small boy's out-of-control descent into New Gower St. would be operative. **CHEAP AT THE PRICE.**—"He told me that the next time he had half a drink he would pay \$10 and beat the face of me" said a witness in an assault case in the Magistrate's Court this morning. The Judge warned the defendant that it would cost him a great deal more than \$10 if he attempted to molest the plaintiff, and bound him over to keep the peace in the sum of \$100.

## Prehistoric Picture of Mastodon.

Bones engraved with figures that resemble prehistoric animals, have been discovered in Jacob's cavern, a prehistoric rock-shelter, located near Piquette, Mo. One of these bones is ornamented with what appears to be a mammoth or mastodon. Another is believed to represent some member of the deer family. Bone and horn awls, flint implements of stone, and shaft straighteners and smoothers were also found in this cave, as were portions of an adult bear skeleton, accompanied by an engraved sandstone pipe. The ornamented bones, when first exhumed, seemed to be perfectly firm and sound, but shortly after they began to disintegrate. Before this occurred, however, it was possible to make pen drawings of the designs and some of the most important of the bones were treated with a preservative.

## TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

**ASTRONOMICAL DISCOVERY.** BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 28. Discovery of a new planet in a group of asteroids, which revolve between the orbits of Jupiter and Mars, is announced by Dr. Hartmann, director of the observatory of the University of La Plata.

**HARDING SUGGESTS SERIES.** LONDON, Nov. 28. President Harding's suggestion for continuing a series of international conferences, the conclusion of which would be observed under "gentlemanly agreement," is given much prominence in morning newspapers, but there is little comment on it. The Westminster Gazette thinks the suggestion, like Secretary Hughes' proposal for limitation of navies is, "profoundly important and profoundly right." Admitting, it says, that the present conference possibly will not achieve any great practical results, the possibilities from further meetings are almost unlimited.



The proceeds will be devoted to the relief of destitution. On Friday night last the first series of these games were run and about 120 players took part.

**WHAT WASHINGTON THINKS.** WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. Current gossip in Armament Conference circles continued to-day to centre on the possibility of a scheme being evolved for the holding of future conferences, and President Harding's endorsement of such a plan. There is a doration of United States opinion, which views the president's move as one which will ultimately bring United States into some form of definite association with other nations, and this naturally gives rise to varied viewpoints as to the political outcome of the proposal.

**XMAS IN WASHINGTON.** LONDON, Nov. 28. Premier Lloyd George is "morally certain" that his next Christmas will be spent in Washington. These were the words used by a member of the Premier's entourage. The British Premier has booked his passage by the Aquitania for next Saturday.

**BEATTY'S STAND.** MONTREAL, Nov. 28. That the right of the British navy to command the seas has never been challenged, and never would be challenged by any Power, was the statement of Admiral Beatty, victor of Jutland, here last night. "It is easy to understand in an Empire, which is flung so wide, whose only communications are on the sea, that connecting links is the command of the sea, and I fully believe that that is a point which has never been challenged by any Power, and, moreover, I believe it never will be challenged." Admiral Beatty made his statements before the Women's Canadian Club.
