## The Brazilian Market.

A city business man who keeps in weekly touch with Bahia, Pernambuco and Maceio, informed the Trade Review yesterday that all the fish stocks held in these cities will be cleared out by the first week in December. Most of these stocks were Norwegian and Canadian fish and of poor quality. The poor financial condition of Brazil compelled the people to use this fish, which they got very cheap.

This Norwegian and Canadian fish got into the market in the war years and the Canadians and Norwegians are now making strenuous efforts to hold on.

Now that conditions are getting better it is up to Newfoundland to prepare to send to Brazil the fish that they want and the fish that Brazilians prefer.

While doing this we must not expect fancy prices. Living costs here must be reduced to enable our fishermen to catch fish at about the present prices for shore fish. Otherwise our competitors will undersell us and

maintain their hold on this market.

Brazil took 462,233 quintals of our fish in 1914. Last year the Brazilians took only 190,521 quintals. We should make an effort to get back to the old time export figures and this can be done.

We have the article Brazil wants and it was through our own fault that we drove the Brazilians to the necessity of eating substitutes as well as the inferior Norwegian, German and Nova Scotia fish.

Much antagonism was also created in Brazil, when we arbitrarily made the attempt to fix a certain price on our fish as marketed in Brazil. The feeling engendered by this action has not yet been quite allayed, but it is wearing off and a readiness to meet Brazilians half way will do much in the way of restoring our former amicable trade relations with them.—Trade Review.

First Prison Demolished.

It was in the early November days that a prison called "The Fleet" was built on the banks of that river, which rising near King's Cross, flowed into the Thames where Blackfriars now stands. The prison stood upon the east of what is now, Farrington Street, which thoroughfare practically follows the river bed. Little is known of its early history, but it was certainly a "King's prison" as

far back as the twelfth century, and in the sixteenth century the religious martyrs—both Protestant and Roman Catholics—were brought there when Mary and Elizabeth respectively occupied the throne. In the days of Charles I., the prisoners who suffered under the Star Chamber, were placed in the Fleet prison, and Puritans were taken there later. It was burnt to the ground in the Great Fire, but was rebuilt, and became the place of confinement for debtors, bankrupts, and those whose crime consisted of contempt of court. In the eighteenth century it became a debtor's prison pure and simple, and was the scene of every kind of brutality and ferocity. Soon after this time the scandal of the Fleet marriages commenced, and assumed its greatest dimensions about the time of the Gordon Riots, when the prison was again burnt. The Fleet Prison was abolished in 1842, and by November 27, 1845, the building was completely swept away. Part of its site was occupied by the newly erected Congregational Memorial Hall. During the period it existed, the Fleet Prison held many notable persons.
