### Newfoundland Fish Products.

Accounts for the year to September 30 last show a net loss of £11,247. This was mainly due to the continued absence of markets for the company's products on the Continent. The cold and wet summer of 1922 also was responsible for a great diminution of the demand for frozen salmon, but it was felt desirable that the trade should be familiarized with the company's salmon, and nearly 650,000 lb. were disposed of during the year. Conditions in Newfoundland have been even worse than in England, and the Newfoundland company's accounts now to hand covering the same period show a loss of \$59,699 on trading and of \$170,081 altogether. By far the greater part of the trading loss was sustained owing to commitments prior to the arrival in St. John's of Mr. Tipping, one of the directors. Since his arrival Mr. Tipping has adopted drastic measures to put the business on a satisfactory basis, and has stated that, in his opinion, it should be possible to conduct it at a profit.—Canada.

### A Cent of Year 1783 Worth \$10,000.

It seems ridiculous to speak of a cent worth \$10,000, yet such is the case. Junius Guttag, 52 Wall Street, has the cent and he places that value on it. "It is the first coin to bear the letters 'U.S.'," says Mr. Guttag. "The first coin upon which the decimal system was based. The date of it is 1783, it is the size of a dime, metal silver, valued intrinsically about three cents." Howland Wood, curator of the American Numismatic Society, 1501 Broadway, confirmed the statement of Mr. Guttag as to the rarity of the coin. There are only two of them in the world.

### Pilotless Plane.

Marcel of Wireless Control. The possibilities of flying controlled by wireless from the ground were shown in a striking fashion at Etampes aerodrome, when a large Colson bombing machine with a 500-h.p. engine and a heavy load took the air entirely by mechanical control, and after flying for half an hour at a height of 1,500ft. was brought back to its starting-point. It made a perfectly smooth landing.

Under the machine is a wireless aerial. Through it are received electric currents which actuate a series of levers controlling the aeroplane.

During the test flight there were two pilots in the machine, but they did not touch the controls. Aeroplanes thus directed and fitted with special engines could be made to fly in the upper regions of the atmosphere, where no pilot could breathe but where the air resistance is so slight that immense speeds could be attained.

### 'Phone 6,000 Can Hear.

A Small Loud-Speaker. A telephone instrument which may have wide applications to both wireless and ordinary telephony has been invented by M. L. Gaumont, who has demonstrated it at the Academy of Sciences in Paris.

The vibrating part of the instrument weighs only 15 grains, and consists of a little cone made of silk wound with a spiral coil of aluminium wire, through which the telephone current passes. This vibrates between cone-shaped poles of an electro-magnet, which are bored with holes in order to let the movements of air caused by the silk cone be transmitted to a horn.

The telephone, which is quite small, is stated to be sufficiently loud for 6,000 people to be able to hear. A modified form of the telephone can be heard 300 yards away.

### To Soften Water.

Bran, barley meal, and oatmeal are all excellent "softeners" which improve hard water, and their inclusion in the toilet water helps to benefit the skin. It is advisable to tie some of the bran or meal in a muslin bag and put it in the bath while the water is running. The soluble part will then be diffused through the water and there will be no danger of choking the waste pipe. The muslin bag should be moved about for a few moments before the water is used.

### The Tramp of the Spider.

Two scientists have been listening to the tramp of a spider.

By means of the ordinary carbon microphone very faint sounds can be detected, and long ago, David Edward Hughes, one of the pioneers of wire-

less and the inventor of the microphone we now use on our telephones, was able to hear on his microphone the tramp of a fly.

There are some wonderful crystals which, when subjected to intermittent pressure, give rise to electric currents and give forth sounds, and

they, too, can be used to magnify inaudible noises. Crystals of quartz, tourmalin, feldspar, sugar, camphor, and so on, have these remarkable properties; but the crystals most responsive to pressure are the crystals of Rochelle salt, which are found in Seidlitz powders.

By means of these Rochelle salt crystals two electricians, Mr. Russell, and Mr. Cotton, have lately been able to hear a small spider walking about. They do not describe the sound of the spider's footfall; but we should imagine that it would be more of a shuffle than a fox-trot. Certainly not a two-step!

#### Lost Treasures

### Church Tower Saved

#### RELIC OF A LOST CITY

Largely owing to the efforts of Bunnell H. Burton, of Ipswich, member of the National Association, the remaining portion of the Dunwich Church Tower, East Angles, has been successfully dug down and removed to a place of safety for re-erection.

This portion of the Church of Saints is all that now remains of the ancient city of Dunwich, which lies beneath the waves a few miles from Southwold.

Dunwich was the cathedral city of St. Felix, the founder of Christianity in East Angles, about the year 600. In the time of Edward I. the sea began to encroach on and surround the city, and in 1744 the Church of Saints, of which the remaining portion is to be preserved, became safe for public worship.
