Municipal Council was held yesterday  
afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and  
Councilors Martin, O'Leary, and  
Mr. Ryan and Dowden were present.  
The Minutes of last meeting were  
read and confirmed, after which the  
following business was disposed of:  
The Deputy Colonial Secretary ac-  
knowledge receipt of Council's re-  
quest communications addressed to  
the Prime Minister, and stated that  
the matter of road grants, etc., would  
have the consideration of the Gov-  
ernment at as early a date as pos-  
sible.Mr. H. Reanne, Secretary of the St.  
John's Gaslight Company, wrote re the  
need of having alterations made to  
the gully at corner of Patrick and  
Water Streets, as after every rain-  
storm considerable damage was done  
to the Company's premises by reason of  
overflow. The Engineer was instructed  
to see what can be done.The residents of Prince of Wales  
Street requested that a concrete drain  
be placed in front of their respective  
buildings so as to take away surface  
water. Arrangements have already  
been made in this connection.A largely signed petition was pre-  
sented by the residents of Prospect  
Street, protesting against vendors  
from suburban settlements being per-  
mitted to park their vehicles on this  
street. They pointed out that in many  
cases the children playing around the  
neighborhood were in serious danger  
from the horses, and that in addition  
the street was left by these people in  
an untidy and insanitary condition.The Sanitary Supervisor, in his  
weekly report, also referred to this  
trouble, and mentioned the above  
street as well as Duckworth, New  
Power and George Streets. He stated  
that on Saturday last some two hun-  
dred horse-wagons were lined up  
along these thoroughfares, and that  
they were in the habit of remain-  
ing until five or six o'clock it was im-  
possible for the Sanitary Department  
to begin at that hour to clean the  
streets after their day's work was  
completed. As a result the streets  
were left in an untidy condition on  
Sundays until attention could be  
given them on Monday mornings. Con-  
siderable discussion arose on this  
matter, and it seemed to be the un-  
animous opinion of the Council thatthese vendors should be taxed for  
their use of the city streets. The law  
with regard to same will be looked  
up, and in the meantime the matter  
is deferred to a future meeting.The application of the C.L.B. Band  
to hold concerts in the City Parks  
during the summer months was grant-  
ed on the same conditions as hereto-  
fore.The application of Messrs. Quigley  
and Power to instal electric motor at  
their premises, Duckworth Street,  
was granted, subject to the approval  
of the City Engineer.Mr. W. F. Whittle called attention  
to the dilapidated condition of dwell-  
ing, Water Street West. The City  
Engineer in speaking on this matter  
endorsed the opinions of Mr. Whittle,  
and it was therefore decided to report  
same to the Medical Officer of Health  
to take action as already done in sim-  
ilar cases.Mr. Mark Chipman's application for  
permit to make alterations to store,  
Prince of Wales Street, was referred  
to the City Engineer.Owing to the several petitions re-  
ceived of late for water and sewer ex-  
tensions in thickly populated areas,  
and in consideration of the grave fire  
hazard through lack of these facilities,  
it was ordered that application be made  
to the Government for the usual guar-  
antees to enable the Council to obtaina loan of \$10,000.00 so that some por-  
tion of this necessary work may be  
undertaken as speedily as possible.With regard to recent communica-  
tion from the Select Vestry of St.  
Mary's Church, Southside, the City  
Engineer and Committee of Council  
reported having visited the Long  
Bridge and taken up with Major Lab,  
of the W. L. Bishop Company, the  
several suggestions made by the peti-  
tioners. The latter, they stated, had  
agreed to lengthen the wooden side-  
walk on the East side and also to sta-  
tion a policeman at the "blind cor-  
ner." The removal of this corner and  
total prohibition of motor traffic, as  
requested in the petition, was, how-  
ever, impracticable.Mr. T. J. Foran, Supervisor of Enu-  
meration, reported that this work had  
been commenced on Monday last, and  
that so far everything was progressing  
satisfactorily.The City Engineer submitted his  
weekly report on work of the Water-  
works, Sewerage and Road Depart-  
ments. He mentioned that arrange-  
ments were being made for the open-  
ing of the swimming pools at Quidi  
Vidi and Long Pond, and that in the  
former case considerable improve-  
ment had been effected; that work of  
repairing and painting bandstand,  
lavatories, etc., at Bannerman Park,**Ingersoll**WRIST

in presentable condition, was nearly  
finished, and that the plumbing instal-  
lations at Bowring Park were being  
attended to.Owing to the disorderly conduct in  
the City Parks of late the Park Com-  
mittee during the week interviewed  
the Inspector General, and had made  
arrangements to engage the services  
of the police in this connection.It was decided to appoint a police-  
man in Victoria Park for the summer  
months, and the services of ex-Ser-  
geant Furlong are to be engaged.Plan submitted by J. L. Dee for the  
erection of a bungalow, Barnes' Road,  
was passed, subject to the approval  
of the City Engineer, from whom ne-  
cessary Building Permit may be ob-  
tained.The Medical Officer of Health in-  
formed the Board that no cases of in-  
fectious disease had been reported in  
the city during the past week.In the matter of outstanding taxes,  
the City Clerk reported that a number  
of writs had lately been taken, and  
that proceedings in execution would  
follow.After reading several other depart-  
mental reports, granting of requisi-  
tions and passing of weekly accounts,
