Attacked Mission

THREE PRESBYTERIAN MISSIONARIES WERE WOUNDED WITH KNIVES.

PEKING, July 12.—Cantonese soldiers on July 9 forced their way into the English Presbyterian Mission at Wukingfu, fifty miles in the interior of Kwangtung, where they beat one missionary and injured him with knives. They also beat two of the women missionaries, cutting them slightly with knives.
 The British Consul at Swatow has demanded an official apology, punishment of the guilty persons and reparation in the form of compensation. The missionaries, after hiding for several hours, left Wukingfu, arriving in Swatow in an exhausted condition. Foreigners were ordered to leave and departed the same day for Swatow.
 Reports reaching here say that the situation in Swatow is growing more critical daily. Chinese employed by British and Japanese have gone on strike, and an embargo has been placed on food supplies to the British and Japanese.

The fact that the city is under two rival military commanders complicates the situation, as there is no proper authority or a sufficient force to cope with the disorder.

FORD'S BID HIGHEST OF THOSE ACCEPTED.

WASHINGTON, July 17.
 A bid of \$1,760,000 from Henry Ford for the 200 Shipping Board vessels to be sold for scrapping was opened with Ford as the highest bidder. The Ford Corporation, which is represented by the Ocean Power Company of \$2,445,000 for the lot, which was unaccompanied by the required certified cheque for one tenth of the amount and so could not be considered, the Ford tender was several hundred thousand dollars higher than any other cash offer. All will be tabulated without delay, for the sale is expected to go forward this week from President Palmer of the Fleet Corporation of the Shipping Board.

Tourist Possibilities in Newfoundland

COL. MONTGOMERIE, M.P., DELIVERS INSTRUCTIVE ADDRESS TO BOARD OF TRADE.

At a largely attended meeting of the Board of Trade, held this afternoon, Colonel Montgomery delivered an interesting and instructive address on the tourist possibilities in Newfoundland. The speaker was introduced by Mr. J. Meenan, Chairman of the Tourist and Publicity Bureau. Colonel Montgomery, who is directly connected with the tourist movement in Nova Scotia, has been in Newfoundland, California, Florida and Maine had commercialized their natural attractions by continent-wide propaganda. The motor car, with the improved roads has been adopted everywhere, had made possible the tremendous increase in recent years in the number of people who travel. They seek a cool climate in summer and a warm one in winter, and in this respect we, with our ideal summer weather may expect to draw the most of our tourists from the Middle New England States, the speaker said.

Dealing with the value of the tourist, he explained that each brings new money into the country, and though it may originally go to the hotel, it is ultimately dispersed throughout the country. "The tourist," said the speaker, "might find beauty spots and build summer residences there. We also get an interchange of ideas from them, and further they may in their stay see opportunity for profitable investment of capital. It is well for us to appreciate the fact that we have unrivalled scenery here as well as opportunities for recreation such as golfing, salt water fishing, bathing, particularly in fresh water." "And," he continued, "these things could be advertised to our advantage."

Pointing out the advantages of capitalizing our historical associations, he made mention of the first Atlantic cable laid at Heart's Content. Signal Hill, where the first Marconi messages were received. The field from where the first trans-Atlantic flight took place, the wireless station at Mount Pearl, Placentia the ancient capital with its wealth of lore, and Ferryland where Lord Baltimore established a settlement, etc. Other things that would interest tourists would be our fishing industries, but the point is, he said, to get these attractions before the public. This could be done, he thought, by direct advertising but to a greater extent through special writers and publicity agents. Colonel Montgomery expressed his conviction that people would come here in great numbers when we succeeded in letting them know what attractions we had to offer, but he felt that we should move cautiously so that we may be prepared to give them the care and attention necessary. Speaking on our roads, he said he was glad to learn that the beautiful drives in the vicinity of St. John's were being lengthened and extended over the peninsula of Avalon. Placentia should, he said, be made a mecca for the tourist. Ferryland, in addition to its other historical associations, held an attraction in the site of the road where a battle between the English and French had taken place.

Fire at Laurenceton

Word has been received in the city of a destructive fire at Laurenceton, Notre Dame Bay, on Friday last when the home of George Hutchings was burnt to the ground. The fire broke out after the family had retired for the night, and they barely escaped with their lives. Mr. C. S. LeDrew, who was one of the first to arrive on the scene, made temporary provision for the family who lost all their belongings.

Panama Canal

Balboa, July 17. (United News)—A total of 4,873 commercial vessels passed through the Panama Canal during the fiscal year of 1925, according to an official report issued here.
 Tolls received from the vessels amounted to \$21,400,000.
 The cargo transported through the canal totalled 24,000,000 tons.
 This amount was an increase of 20 per cent. over the figures for 1923, but a decrease from the high of 1924. The drop principally was due to a decrease in the traffic in oil tankers from California to the Atlantic coast.

There are 12 West Coast hankers getting from 50 to 60 qtls. daily with trawls; fishery not so good with traps. Better results are hoped this week.

Point Amour to Red Bay—Total landed to date 1640 qtls. for the week 600 qtls.; 14 traps in water, 60 boats operating; prospects very fair.
 Cape St. Lewis to Cape Charles—Total landed to date 200 qtls., 45 traps in water, with 33 skiffs; prospects poor; caplin in deep water; codfish very scarce this week, no quantity taken, boats have not averaged 1 qtl. each this week; some few traps got a quintal or two.

Port aux Basques to Corbin—Total landed to date 1645 qtls. for the week 1745 qtls.; 62 traps have accounted for 945 qtls., 40 dorries and skiffs 300 qtls., 1 banker 500 qtls. Prospects somewhat brighter; some caplin.

More Than Ever

It seems that London this year is proving more attractive than ever to the Americans as a centre for a European holiday. Although the American season can hardly be said to have begun, no fewer than eight thousand Transatlantic holidaymakers have reached our shores in one week. The phenomenal prosperity of the United States means that many people who formerly never left their shores can now afford to undertake the European visit, of which they have dreamed for a lifetime. Last year incomes liable to taxation in America came to the vast total of five thousand million pounds. This represents a thousand million pounds increase over the previous year. In other words, Americans are rushing in large numbers into the individual state of prosperity in which their incomes are taxed for the first time.

Baked, Boiled and Stewed

WHEN IT COMES TO A TUSSE WITH THE THERMOMETER, MAN-KIND CAN PUT UP A GOOD FIGHT.

In a recent police court case it was stated that some Arab stowaways had lived for sixty-three hours in cramped quarters immediately over the ship's boilers.

The human frame possesses astonishing elasticity, and can survive exposure to almost unbelievable heat. As long ago as 1774, Sir Joseph Banks, the scientist, entered a room with a temperature of 211 degrees, or more than twice what is known as tropical heat, and remained there for seven minutes. The temperature of this experimental room was subsequently raised to 260 degrees, and Sir Charles Bladen, another scientist, remained in it for eight minutes. In this atmosphere beefsteak was done to a turn in thirty-three minutes.

At Home in the Furnaces.

But these are comparatively low temperatures compared with some that workmen who are, so to speak, acclimatized, can endure.
 It is on record that men cleaning furnaces have worked without injury at a temperature of 340 degrees, though their wooden clogs were charred by the heat of the iron floor.
 There is a subtle mechanism by which the human body rapidly adapts itself to changes of temperature. In the case of heat, resistance is due to
