

The County Council of Bruce and the W. G. & B. Railway.

The Hamilton Spectator to-day has as a telegraph from Walkerton to the effect that the statement made by the Hamilton deputation as to the position of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce lines, made before the County Council, produced a good effect. All are now convinced of the vitality of the project. The Toronto deputation addressed the Council last night. In their letter to the Warden they propose delay of action until they come to the boundary of Bruce, suggest a new route, and rebuke Bruce and other municipalities for "dislocating" their scheme.

The Railway Committee brought in a report in favour of a by-law for a bonus of \$20,000 to the first company that will be in a position to accept, within two months, a proposal to build a line to Lake Huron. Messrs Rastall and Scholes moved an amendment, which was lost, and the report was adopted by a good majority.

The Spectator says: "This proposal was carried by a large majority over the amendment moved in the interest of the Narrow Gauge promoters, who virtually admit their inability to go on at present, and claim only the near completion of arrangements for their first section, while the W. G. & B. have several hundred men at work on the first section and their bonuses voted for the second section."

SOUTH RENFREW.—The nomination for South Renfrew takes place on the 25th inst. There are two candidates in the field, Hon. Malcolm Cameron, and Mr. J. L. McDougall, M.P.P. The canvass is being pursued with vigour, and it is believed that the latter gentlemen's chances of success are the best. He is a resident of the riding, is well known, and influential. The address which Mr. Cameron has issued to the electors is not remarkable for its clearness. He is very reticent with regard to his intentions or his future actions should he be elected, contenting himself, and, he probably presumes, the people of South Renfrew with referring to his past record, which is scarcely so reassuring that he should put unbounded faith in it. He was a Reformer at one time, and in the Hinks administration held the office of Postmaster General, which he resigned in order to accept the Queen's Printership. He has been several things, but he is careful not to let people know what he intends to be next.

BREAKERS AHEAD.—On Thursday night a motion was made in the House of Commons for concurrence in an item in the supply for the Kingston Penitentiary. An amendment, that the salaries should be the same as last year was put and carried by a vote of 56 to 44. In reference to this the correspondent of the Globe says: "The defeat of the Government last night, by the desertion of their own supporters, is the general subject of conversation. It was directly caused by Sir George E. Cartier's friends refusing to follow him, and Sir John has taken a personal view of the matter. Last night in the lobbies after the House rose, he threatened if the vote was not reversed, he would resign. The matter is a serious personal one between Sir George E. Cartier and Sir John and may lead to an open rupture. The supporters of the Government are becoming greatly demoralized."

The Americans insist that England shall not only pay for the damage done to their shipping by the Confederate cruiser, Alabama, but also demand an apology for her being allowed to leave the Mersey. We wonder what they intend doing themselves in the case of the Quaker City, which secretly sailed from New York on Tuesday night en route to Hayti, with arms, men and munitions of war. She has had her name changed to the Columbia, of London, and floated the British ensign at her topmast. This is the second or third vessel that has departed on a similar mission with the connivance of the United States authorities. A nice way of observing neutrality indeed.

THE MCGEE FUND.—A meeting of the general committee of the McGee Testimonial Fund, consisting of the members of the two Houses, was held in Ottawa on Saturday, when the trustees submitted an account, showing the total receipts to have been \$6,500; debts paid off, and expenses, \$4,576; remaining due, \$1,924. But this claim is secured by Mechanics' Bank stock to the amount of \$2,000. It was proposed to remit £125 sterling to Mr. McGee's sister in Wexford, who is in distressed circumstances, and to hand over the balance to Mrs. McGee, towards payment of the debt of \$1,924.

Mr. McDougall stated in the House on Friday night that it was the intention of the Government to send out a surveyor into the North-west for the purpose of ascertaining whether it would be practicable to construct a railway through the territory.

W. G. & B. RAILWAY.—The movements of the deputation from the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway have been narrowly and jealously watched by the Narrow Gauge men. As soon as it was known that the former were in Bruce, a deputation consisting of Messrs. Gordon, Laidlaw, McMaster and Hague started from Toronto, and the Bruce County Council having been apprised of their intention of being present deferred action on the railway question until their arrival. The statements of the gentlemen from Hamilton were well received, and much pleasure was manifested at the fact of the first section of the road being in course of construction.

THE GRAND TRUNK.—In a letter of Mr. Brydges, concerning the road of which he is manager, he says: "I take the opportunity to add what are simply matters of fact that the Grand Trunk Railway is throughout at this moment, in a better condition than it has been at this time of the year since 1860—that its trains are throughout running with great regularity—and that, notwithstanding the general dullness of trade in Canada, the receipts of the railway are increasing at the rate of \$20,000 a week, which is the best evidence of its increasing usefulness to the country."

Holliday, Hooper, and Hadden. There may be some more whose names we have been unable to ascertain. Seven or eight member of the Eramosa Company will also be competitors. They leave this afternoon by the 4.10 train for the scene of action.
