SHERIFF WITHSTANDS MOB

Marshall, Texas, Oct.—Sheriff John C. Sanders, of Harrison County, has again demonstrated that a courageous officer, determined to stand his ground, is more than a match for the average mob. Some days ago two Negroes killed some white men in a controversy in an adjoining county. Mob violence was threatened and the prisoners were brought here for safe keeping. A mob followed and started to storm the jail. Sheriff Sanders urged them to disperse and all but thirteen left. These persisted, however, and the plucky sheriff arrested the whole thirteen and locked them up.

This makes five cases in Texas this year in which mobs bent on lynching have been successfully defied by faithful sheriffs, backed by public opinion. In one case, that in Dallas, a member of the mob was killed by officers who were defending their prisoner.
