An Eloquent Irishman.

James' Presbyterian Church. Mr. Patterson
has a wide reputation as a brilliant
speaker and an able exponent of the
Gospel. His audience last night was a
large one and must have been impressed by
his earnest, impressive remarks. Mr.
Patterson is a man of deep and original
thought; he is also possessed of happy
declamatory powers, and his wit glitters
in his addresses. He speaks at the
same place to-night and to-morrow
evening.

A Prosperous Institution.
Attention is called to the advertisement

"The Fire Patrol" drew a good house to
the Grand last night. It is a sensational
melodrama, cleverly constructed and well
written, but with a healthy supply of humor
and a number of climaxes sufficiently thrill-
ing. The scenic and stage effects were not
up to expectations, probably because the
stage was not large enough to show the
appearance of the various dragons and
horses, which had been extensively adver-
tised. The scene in the stamp mills, show-
ing the ore-crushers in operation, was
realistic, and the curtain was rung up
twice. The company is ably aided by their
auditors, and were once again pleased. George Rose
is a very clever comedian, and Little George
Enos, as a street wail, is a remarkable child
actor.

Laid in the Grave.
The funeral of the late Emma A. Leslie
took place this afternoon from the family
residence, No. 152 Horton street, and was
attended by a very large number of sym-
pathizing friends. Rev. Ira Smith, of Talbot
Street Baptist Church, conducted the
services, and other tributes from relatives and
friends. The remains were taken to Mount
Pleasant Cemetery, the pall-bearers being
Messrs. Nat. Mills, Fred E. Lea, E. J.
Leach, John Holman, Albert Rickard and
R. Brown.

A Pretty Lamp Shade.
It is easy to make a pretty lamp shade
by carefully sticking dried flowers between
two pieces of white tracing paper, cut to
form a portion of a lamp shade. When
about eight of them are finished, sew them
together with white silk. Obtain the right
shape by buying a wire frame of the flowers
the lamp is to be made of. The dried flowers
are fastened to the wire frame, and the effect
is pretty. Candle shades can also be
made the same way, only they do not need
cutting in more than one place.

FIRES AND FIREMEN.
\$18,706 38 to Run the Depart-
ment Last Year.

Chief Roe Submits an Interesting An-
nual Report.

Losses in 1921 Total \$21,871. Insurance
\$41,406—The Requirements of
the Service—Under the
Appropriation.

Mr. John A. Roe, chief of the city fire
department, submitted at a meeting of No. 3
Committee last night, the nineteenth annual
report, showing the amount of work done,
the present condition of the department
and the expenditure in connection therewith
for last year. The following is the sub-
stance of the report:

On July 1, 1921, the services of six call-
men were dispensed with and six others were
appointed permanently on the staff.
On the same date a station, fully
equipped with hose carriage, hose and a
team of horses, was put into active service
in No. 6 ward, with Mr. John Aitken,
formerly station foreman at No. 1 station,
in command. The total number of officers
and men now on the roll of the department
is nineteen (one less than in 1920), located
as follows: No. 1 station, 10; No. 2, 5;
No. 3, 4. He also gave a detailed account
of all the apparatus at each station, and
recommended the immediate purchase of a
hook and ladder truck for No. 1
station, and that a pair of sleighs
be provided for each of the others.

"We have 3,850 feet of first-class cotton
hose in stock, 550 feet second-class and 500
feet of third-class. We will need 1,000
feet of new hose this year to keep our stock
up to the standard. We have also 1,450
feet of old rubber hose, which is only fit
for flushing sewers and putting on the
watering wagons." The chief also pointed
out the necessity of providing the men
with uniforms, and the other duties do. The
electrician was all in first-class condition.
The electrician was discharged on Feb. 4,
1921, and Chief Roe took charge of the fire
alarm service, and was glad to be able to
report that the service was giving as good
if not better results than it did before the
change. A great deal of credit for this
was due to the foreman, Mr. A. McMurry,
who had been indefatigable in his efforts to
keep the service in good shape. Other
members of the department had also
rendered valuable aid. The system had
been changed from one to four circuits and
all the work was done by the department
without extra cost to the city except for
material. The report called the attention
of the committee to an alleged serious
defect in the fire alarm system—the number of
pieces of boxes in the service. Each style
had to be worked differently in order to
give an alarm. It also recommended that
immediate action be taken to have the
boxes made uniform in working and
non-interfering if possible.

"There were 123 alarms of fire received
by the department during the year, one less
than in 1920. The total insurance was
\$5,140 more than in 1920, while the losses
were \$36,072 less. We had no large fires
to contend with this year, which I think is
a tribute to the promptness and efficiency
of the department. Eighty-five of the
alarms were for fires from which more or
less damage resulted. Twenty-seven were
false alarms and three were test runs
for the benefit of visiting deputations. We
attended 100 out of the 123 alarms, and
worked at 67 of them. In going and re-
turning from these alarms the horses and
apparatus traveled 4194 miles. No. 1
brigade laid 24,200 feet of hose and had 57
streams in operation; No. 2 laid 9,900 feet
and had 23 streams, and No. 3 laid 2,700
feet and used 5 streams. An approxi-
mate estimate gives 498,000 gallons as the
quantity of water used at these fires.

The number of buildings destroyed was 8.
The report also gave a detailed account of
the supposed origin of each fire. There
were 25 alarms received by telephone, 60
from fire alarm boxes, 29 were verbal, 4
were from the City Hall and 2 from the
locomotive whistles. The insurance on the
buildings was \$193,800, and on contents
\$217,650; total, \$411,450. The loss on the
buildings was \$10,420 50, and on the contents
\$11,451 19—total, \$21,871 69—an
average of \$27 30 per fire for 55 fires.

The expense incurred on No. 1 hall was
\$7,001 60; at No. 2, \$3,410 05; and at No. 3,
\$4,461 04. The net expenditure amounted
to \$15,706 38. The estimate for the
year submitted in June was \$16,400, leav-
ing a balance in favor of the department of
\$1,693 42. Chief Roe thanked the officers
and members of the fire department for
their promptness and efficiency. No. 3
Committee and the mayor for their courtesy
and kindness and the police force for valu-
able assistance rendered.

It was decided to call for tenders for
1,000 feet of 2 1/2 inch rubber-lined fabric
hose, 100 feet of heavy 1 1/2 inch hose, 8
rubber coats, 12 pairs gum boots, 6 fire
hats, 2 play pipes and nozzles and 2 pull
axes. The chief was empowered to get
estimates for several small articles, such as
uniforms and caps, for the men, and to
purchase others needed at once. He recom-
mended the purchase of 2 large mechanical
gongs with indicators, 3 pairs of magnets
for the doors and four lightning arrestors.
No action was taken on these.

In another report Chief Roe stated that
No. 1 ward had 9 alarm boxes; No. 2, 10;
No. 3, 7; No. 4, 8; No. 5, 7 and No. 6, 6—
a total of 47. The locations for new boxes
were as follows: No. 1 ward—one on
corner of Richmond and Simcoe streets and
one between Hunt's mills and Abbott's
brewery; No. 2 ward—corner Park and
Queen's avenues and one on corner of
George and St. James streets; No. 4 ward
—one on corner of Princess avenue and
Wellington streets; Waterloo and Central
avenue and St. James and Colborne streets;
wards 4 and 5—Pall Mall and Adelaide;
ward 5—Laura and Eva and Sackville and
Dame; ward 6—South of boxes 18 and 28;
ward 3—Horton and Colborne and Hamil-
ton road and Adelaide street.

Chief Roe asked that the old frame cot-
tage just east of No. 1 hall be removed.
Tenders will be called for the purchase and
removal of the house. Lumber will also be
furnished with which to build out bins at
No. 1 hall and also to roof over the horse
stable.

The committee decided to take up a por-
tion of the report at each meeting until it
should be all dealt with.

GRANGER'S PARLIAMENT.
Ontario's Educational System
Approved.

Interesting Report by the Secretary—
Dormant Sub-Granges Revived.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.
Worthy Master Glendinning took the
chair at 2 p.m. The Committee on Educa-
tion, we believe, had the following: We your
Committee on Education beg leave to express
our approval of the present educational
system. Especially do we approve of the
advantages offered to farmers and farmers'
children in both practical and scientific
principles of agriculture. We are also
pleased with the introduction of an agri-
cultural text-book into our rural schools,
and would recommend that the use
of it be made compulsory in such
schools as far as practicable. But
while we recommend the use of them,
we condemn the system of printing that is
giving the contract to one firm only (as we
understand it is the case), thereby destroying
competition and keeping the price of the
book above what we believe to be the in-
trinsic value of it.

The Committee on Officers' Reports re-
ported as follows: We would say that,
having heard the Executive Committee's
report, we believe that they have trans-
acted the business that has been intrusted
to them in a very satisfactory manner,
economically and otherwise, and not with
the intent of gain, and think they should
be commended on their work. We beg
leave to state that we have examined the sec-
retary's report, and would recommend it for
adoption, as we believe he has discharged
his duty in a careful and systematic man-
ner.

Bro. Robt. Wilkie, secretary, in his re-
port, stated that his extensive correspon-
dence during the past year on grange mat-
ters had extended from the Rocky Moun-
tains to the Atlantic Ocean; that he had
sent out nearly 700 copies of the proceedings
of last annual meeting, and 400 circulars in
June and July last, for discussion in the
subordinate granges. In connection
prices have been generously awarded by
the Farmer's Advocate for the best essay
upon any of the subjects as discussed.
Nearly 500 circulars announcing this meet-
ing will arrive in London next Monday, Feb.
11, and permanently locate at their res-
