Adams vs. Semerville.

This suit, an action to obtain an injunction restraining the defendant, C. R. Somerville, of this city, from manufacturing Mexican Fruit Chewing Gum, was heard at Osgoode Hail, Toronto, Tuesday before Judge Robertson. DuVernet & Featherstonhaugh, of Toronto, for plaintiffs, T. H. Purdom for the defendant. The judge decided in favor of the defendants with full costs, and in doing so he very severely reprimanded the plaintiffs, the Adsms & Sons Company, of Brooklyn, New York, for the manner in which they brought the action and then attempt to obtain by misleading statements the benefit of the defendant's trade in Canada. He said the plaintiff's case had a very sandy foundation, while the defendant's appeared founded on a rock. The plaintiff came into court with unclean hands, as from their own evidence they were attempting to sell goods under false pretenses. They asked an injunction to restrain the defendant from selling his brand of Mexican Fruit Chewing Gum, that they might place on the market under that name a gum they acknowledged to be identical with their Tutti Frutti. This was a fraud on the public. But outside of this fact altogether, the judge said they had no case. So far as the defendant's label for "Mexican Fruit" and the Adams label of "Tutti Frutti" was concerned, he would doubt very much the sanity of any person that would be misled by them. The judge found that the defendant had invented the name Mexican Fruit and had placed his goods extensively in the market, while the plaintiffs had throwing any stones.

SPECULATIONS IN FUTURES.

Rev. A. C. Courtice Predicts the Future of the Indian, the Airican and the Canadian.

of the Indian, the African and the Canadian.

"Speculating in Futures" was indulged in by Rev. A. C. Courtice at Dundas Center Methodist Church Tuesday night. A fair audience greeted him. The meeting was opened with a duet by Miss Ida Smythe and Percy Carroll and the reading of the one hundredth Psalm by Rev. Mr. Godwin, of London West.

Mr. Courtice first dealt with the future of the Indian. Blood relationship, language and literature and religion had the effect of uniting English-speaking people. The Indian was the orphan of this continent, deprived of father and mother. He should therefore be protected and defended. The gift of our Government should never be wrong; it should never be liquor. In 1876 Keewatin was detached from the Northwest Territories. In this district there were rivers teeming with fish, and mines of immense value. No liquor was formerly allowed to be brought into or made in the territories, for the Indian cannot abstain from drinking it. The region will some day be carved into provinces. Drunkenness and other crimes have increased rapidly since permits have been granted by which 4-percent, beer could be taken among Indians. In 1888 there were 36 convicted for drunkenness; in 1889, 41, and in 1890 there In 1888 there were 36 convicted for drunkenness; in 1889, 41, and in 1890 there were 92, while five years before there were none at all. In one year 183,670 gallons of strong drink were imported among them, and probably an equal amount was smuggled.
The future of the Indian may be expressed in one word—"extinction," not civilization.
The cause may be attributed to one great evil—liquor.
The African in Africa had a future aking the Indian in Canada. Slavery

to that of the Indian in Canada. Slavery and strong drink were the causes. The Arabs were oppressing the Africans shamefully. The slave trade was the demon that followed Livingstone during the last twenty years of his life.
