CHILI'S CABINET RESIGNS. Lima, Dec. 15 .-- The entire Chilian cabinet has resigned.

JAPAN PROTESTS. London, Dec. 15 .- The Japanese consul at Sydney, N. S. W., has formally protested to the premier against the unfriendly character of the proposed legislation as to aliens. The committee of the Legislative Assembly to which the measures were referred had recently passed the bills, extending the Chilese restriction act to "other colored people, except British subjects," and restricting immigration by an educational test

GERMAN OCCUPATION OF CHINA. London, Dec. 15.-According to a special dispatch from Shanghai, the German government contemplates colonizing the province of Shan Tung with German families, and making Kiao Chau an open port. On orders from Pekin the Chinese troops have been withdrawn still further from Kiao Chau, to prevent a conflict. Viceroy Chang Chih Tung denounces the cowardice of the Pekin authorities in yielding to Germany, and declares his own readiness to lead the troops against the Germans.

MISHAP TO A STEAMER. London, Dec. 15 .- The French Line steamer La Touraine, from New York. Dec. 4, which should have arrived Sunday morning last, reached Havre shortly after midnight. According to state ments by the captain and officers La Touraine lost her port propeller at 9:50 a.m. on the 7th. She proceeded with a single screw, but her speed was still further reduced by the bad weather. No anxiety whatever was displayed by the stories.

> WILL BOUNCE THE GOVERNOR. Vienna, Dec. 15.-It is said here that Count von Coudenhoven, governor of Bohemia, will be dismissed and be replaced by Herr David von Rhonfeld, governor of Dalmatia. The count is charged with having characterized the Germans in Prague as "aliens." The police president and the burgomaster of Prague will be removed, it is said, and the town council dissolved. The administration of the city will be entrusted to an imperial commissioner. Among the persons under arrest for pillaging there is the son of a millionaire. The Germans still dread a fresh attack.

> OCEAN MAILS. London, Dec 15.-The New Zealand House of Representatives passed a resolution submitted by the premier, Hon. Richard J. Seddon, in favor of establishing a fortnightly mail service between Wellington and San Francisco, and between Wellington and Vancouver, B. C. It is uderstood that the proposal referred to is to subsidize an alternate fortnightly mail service between the points named, passages from Wellington to San Francisco not to exceed 19 days, and passages from Wellington to Vancouver not to ex-

# Returned From the Klondike.

Prospect of Trouble Regarding the Boundary Line.

Famine Prices Prevailing in the Capital.

Candles a Dollar Each and Flour \$125 a Sack.

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 15.—Passengers of the steamer Alki, which has arrived here from Skaguay, Alaska, report that according to a new ruling of Deputy United States Collector of Customs Floyd, at Skaguay, goods purchased in Canada and brought to Skaguay must either pay duty or \$6 per day be given a customs official while the goods are in transit to the international boundary line. Collector Floyd has already collected duties on five outfits from British Columbia, the owners paying the duty rather than pay a customs official to travel with The Schooner Thurlow Goes to the them to the line. Owing to the dispute over the location of the boundary line, it is feared that bad feeling may be engendered by Collector Floyd's interpretation of the customs laws. The Juneau (Alaska) Searchlight publishes a letter dated Dawson City, N. W. T., Oct. 14, which, among other things, says:

put of this district this winter. Can-

dies are now worth and selling for \$1 'Prices for everything are in the skies. Fur caps are worth \$25, moccasins from \$5 to \$10, mitts the same, window of six small lights \$25 to \$50, padlocks \$20 apiece, stoves that cost \$6 in Juneau sell for \$40, sleds \$25, etc. Wood is worth \$30 per cord. Horses which sold readily for \$500 apiece are now being butchered and sold for 75 cents a pound. It is being bought for dog feed. Dogs are scarce and sell readily for \$150. "Two sawmills have been running night and day all summer and selling lumber for \$140, and at the present time people cannot get lumber to finish their houses. Any kind of a cabin rents for \$50 a month, and a good cabin 18x20 nearby rents for \$100 per month. "Several miners' meetings have been held to discuss the food question, and a careful estimate made by the government officials and transportation companies fixes the number of persons here at 7,000, and a food supply sufficient for only one-half of them, so that the government, the companies and everybody with supplies have been urging and helping unprovided people to go down the river. My personal opinion is that there will be some suffering, but that provisions are not so scarce as generally reported. "There are plenty of people here who think that hundreds of men will die of starvation before spring in this vicinity, but I cannot believe it is that serious. There is still a possibility that there will be one or more boats up yet if the river remains open for a

week or two." GOLD STRIKE IN TEXAS. San Antonio, Tex., Dec. 15.-There is great excitement throughout this section over reports of the richness of the recent gold fields on Indian creek. 100 miles west of here. One assay of ore just made ran \$4,750 to the ton. Over 200 claims have been staffed off, and the prospectors are rushing to the place from this city and the neighboring farms and ranches.

Mrs. Langtry Ruled Out of London

Jockey Club Society. New York, Dec. 15 .- A dispatch to the World from London says: The report that Mrs. Langtry will into society is more than offset by a resolution that has been passed by the Jockey Club, which is aimed directly at her. The resolution says that "for the future, ladies, other than the wives, daughters and sisters of the members of the club will be admitted to the inclosure and private stands of the club at Newmarket and on other racecourses only on presentation of a voucher, signed by a member of the club, together with the payment of £1." Until the resolution was passed a member of the club had a right to pass into the Jockey Club inclosures and into the private stands any woman whom he saw fit. There has been a general impression that Mrs. Langtry has had the freedom of the race track but this is not true. Until the death of her husband, two months ago, she was kept out of the inclosure and private stands of the Jockey Club. It was on the day that her husband died and the day that her horse, Merman, won one of the great racing events of the year at Newmarket and nearly \$100,000 for Mrs. Langtry, that she was admitted into the inclosure, and within the pale of the Jockey Club's society.
