TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 2-11 p.m.—The pressure is highest over the Maritime Provinces and the Southern States and lowest over the Lake Superior and in Alberta. The weather to-day has been showery in Eastern Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces and fine in Western Ontario, Manitoba and the Northwest Territories.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 50°-72°; Calgary, 42°-90°; Prince Albert, 52°-74°; Qu'Appelle, 56°-76°; Winnipeg, 60°-74°; Toronto, 65°-75°; Montreal, 64°-70°; Quebec, 60°-70°; Halifax, 60°-62°.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Ereoson Smith, who does the blacksmithing of the department, has had a large forge erected in the rear of the central hall.

—People who cannot attend the World's Fair will be pleased to hear that the Irish Benevolent Society's annual picnic may come of this month.

The employees of C. S. Hyman & Co., E. Leacock & Sons and the London Machine Tool Company picnic at Port Stanley on Saturday next.

The Midway mills on the Proof Line were sold by J. W. Jones, auctioneer, yesterday to R. C. Barter, of Toronto, for \$200 over the mortgage of \$2,600.

—Excavation has been made for a three-story brick building on King street near Clarence, to be occupied by R. Dennis as a blacksmith shop and wire factory.

The Salvation Army will hold a musical jubilee in St. Thomas this evening. Part of the London brass band and all of the choral band, with a number of soldiers, will unite with St. Thomas.

—Friday next, Aug. 5, being the annual holiday of the smiths of the city, they have decided to close their places of business on that day. The public requiring any work done will govern themselves accordingly.

—Victoria Park has become rather dusty owing to protracted hot weather, and the tamping of hundreds of feet last night raised a cloud in the promenade portion which was recklessly inhaled. The crowd was big—very big—and the concert was of the usual order.

—Mr. C. McCallum has purchased a sheriff's sale by auction the stock of Messrs. C. McCallum & Co., wholesale druggists, at 45 cents on the dollar, cash. The firm to which Mr. McCallum sold out three years ago, was into liquidation a couple of weeks ago at the suit for \$27,000 of the Bank of B. N. A.

—During the last three months License Inspector Durand, of East Middlesex, has laid complaints against eight persons charging them either with selling liquor without a license or selling during prohibited hours. Only one case was dismissed, that of Mrs. Henderson, Welling Barner, Wm. Carroll, Peter Young, Geo. Graham and Michael Ward each paid a fine of \$20 and costs.

—The Central Prison for three months is default of payment.

Central Bank Bill.

It may not be generally known that Central Bank bills are no longer negotiable. The final dividend was recently paid and all the books of the institution stored away in the vaults at Osgoode Hall, Toronto. There is, therefore, no more assets to redeem any bills that may be in circulation.

Opera House Deluge.

"The Harvest Moon" which will be at the Grand Saturday night, is a most interesting story, dramatic and effective. The St. Louis Chronicle says: "The Harvest Moon is really fine in its theme and the treatment thereof. It is one of the most effective dramas that has been seen since 'Jim the Penman'."

The regular season commences next month and will open with Hermann, the great musician. Mr. A. E. Roote's many friends will be pleased to hear that he has been appointed manager of the London Opera House.

Serious Accident.

A serious runaway accident occurred last evening at about 7 o'clock which may result fatally to a driver. Mr. John Kelly, a well known farmer who resides near Lambeth, was driving homeward after having disposed of a load of wood in the city, and when a short distance west of the Victoria bridge the horses took fright and ran away. The wagon came in contact with a telegraph pole, throwing Mr. Kelly violently on the ground, rendering him unconscious. He is seriously, if not fatally injured. The wagon was completely wrecked. Mr. Kelly is a brother of the Lambeth postmaster. He has a family.

The Picnic To-day.

This is the day of the great annual picnic of St. Andrew's Society and the Clan Fraser at Port Stanley. Last night the committee were busy packing "sweeties" for the juveniles. There are many valuable prizes to be competed for, thanks to the friends of the society. The Woodstock friends will come by special train to London, and join the procession here, "kiss an' a'". Four carloads of Fraser's minister picnic are expected from Glanworth. The officers and committee intend dining together at the Fraser House in the evening. Trains leave London at 9:30 and 10 a.m., and 2:30 and 4:15 p.m., returning 4:35, 5:30 and 9:30 p.m.

A Bold Attack and Robbery.

Mr. Richard Jarvis, of Wreay street, South London, had an unpleasant experience Saturday evening. He was walking on the balcony, just outside the city limits, towards a relative's house, about 8 o'clock, when it happened. He had noticed two men walking behind him, but paid no attention to them, and a moment afterwards a crushing blow on the head from a club stretched him senseless on the ground.

When he recovered consciousness he found his clothes had been rifled and \$2 in cash taken from his pants' pockets. Luckily Mr. Jarvis had a large sum of money concealed in a pocket in his vest, and this had escaped the thieves. The attack was a dastardly and bold one, as it was committed in open daylight. Mr. Jarvis can hardly identify the perpetrators as they struck him from behind, and had decamped before he came to. He injured his face by falling on the roadway, and has since been unable to work.

A London Girl's Close Call.

"On Tuesday last, while Miss Jennie Black, of London, Ont., and her cousin, Miss Jennie Gross, were bathing at Sturgeon Point, Miss Black got beyond her depth, and not being a swimmer began to struggle to keep her head above water, and with each successive struggle was getting into deeper water. Her little cousin who had been swimming even beyond Miss Black

was caught by the drowning girl, and both would have been victims of the waves but for the timely assistance rendered by Mr. Frank Britton, of Lindsay. Mr. Britton seeing Miss Black in her perilous condition went to the rescue, jumped in and caught her with his arms and paddled to shore with the other. He then saw the other girl, who had been below the surface, come to the top, and at once plunged in again and brought his second precious burden safely to land. It is almost unnecessary to add that Mr. Britton has received well-deserved congratulations from all quarters. We are applying for a Royal Humane Society medal for Mr. Britton's bravery." (Lindsay Warrier.)

The signal service observatory at Toronto has issued an interesting statement regarding the weather of July. The month, it appears, was not so very hot after all. It may surprise some to find that the average temperature of July differs only 0.4 in excess of the average of the previous 52 years, but it will have to be considered that the first and third division of the month were decidedly below the normal, and that the second group was only 1.5 above, and as the present makes the strongest impression, the fourth group, the average of which was 74.8, or 7.5 above the normal, convinced many that July had been something extraordinary; in fact there are no less than nineteen warmer Julys than the past month, the warmest recorded being 72.5 in 1854, 75.8 in 1868, 79.0 in 1878 and 73.1 in 1887. The average highest temperature of the past month was 78.8; in 1854 it was 84.8; 1856, 80.4; 1868, 85.4; 1872, 80.7; 1877, 80.2; 1878, 80.4; 1881, 80.3; 1887, 81.7. Although the highest temperature recorded was 83.4, or nearly 5 above the normal highest temperature of Toronto, 90.7—this has been exceeded in twelve years, the extremes being 98.0 on July 19, 99.2 on Aug. 24, 1854, and 97.2 on July 16, 1887. It is worthy of note that during 1854 the highest temperatures of June, July, August and September were all considerably above 90.

LATEST SCOTTISH NEWS.

The marriages in Scotland in June last numbered 502 above the average.

The death is announced at Pinkie House, Musselburgh, recently, of Sir John David Hope of Pinkie, Bart., at the advanced age of 83 years.

A medical paper says that the ladies of Edinburgh have long been famed for their graceful motion, but as for the males, they cannot walk but tottle.

Mrs. Matilda Park, Allahabad, India (nee Miss Alice Orr, Clonville Bank House, Halesburg), died recently. She was only twenty last year to be married.

The last provost of Glasgow has received from Mr. George Rodman, for many years manager of the Clydesdale Bank, a check for £5,000, to be distributed among Glasgow charities.

No well-read Scotchman, remarks a writer in the Scottish American, uses the word "pretender" when speaking of Prince Charlie, no matter what his political opinions may be.

Rev. James Denny, Free Church minister, Broughty Ferry, and a native of Greenock, has declined a call to the Square congregation, London, to become successor to the Rev. John McNeill.

Shortly before his death Wilkie Collins wrote to a friend saying, "I had been reading 'Guy Maunier' again for the 50th time at least. That wonderful book was written in six weeks! What a set of pignies we are by comparison with Scott."

On July 14, at the fashionable church of St. Paul's, Knightsbridge, London, with full clerical service and amid splendid floral decorations, the marriage took place of the Earl of Mar and Kellie and Lady Susan Violet Ashley, fourth daughter of the late Earl of Shaftesbury and the Countess of Shaftesbury.

HORNETS CAPTURE A TRAIN.

Passengers Battle for Half an Hour with the Vicious Insects.

Thov, N. Y., Aug. 3.—The passengers on the Lehighon Springs Railroad between Petersburg Junction and Bennington had an exciting and novel experience the other day. The morning train for Bennington had not proceeded more than half a mile when a buzzing and excited swarm of hornets was discovered close to the ceiling of the rear of the third car. Presently a hornet started out on an exploring tour and evidently came back in a warlike frame of mind, for he flew dangerously low and darted viciously at several passengers. He was struck at with hats and newspapers, and forced to beat retreat. He was immediately reinforced by hundreds more and down through the aisle they flew in a swarm. Everyone of the 30 passengers followed the example of a "drummer," who got under his seat. For full 30 minutes there was a battle between the hornets and passengers.
