FLOODS IN QUEBEC.

Several Important Bridges Swept
Away—Drummond Railway
Bridge Sifted.

Quebec, April 21.—The recent rains
and warm weather have caused floods
on nearly all the rivers on both sides
of the St. Lawrence. The water has
risen on the Chaudiere River four feet
higher than the highest mark re-
corded in the past.

The iron bridge of the Drummond
Railway at Chaudiere has moved eight
inches on its piers.

The old wooden bridge at St. Ron-
dard has been carried away.

At Beauce Junction the extensive
bridge of the Quebec Central Rail-
way is threatened with destruction.
In the Etchemin River and has carried
away the Quebec Central bridge at St.
Anselme. A bridge was carried away
in the same manner in 1896 at this
place, and to this day the ruins of the
new bridge was made strong and
built four feet above the previous high
water mark. It was a very fine struc-
ture of steel, and as a result of its
carrying away no trains have moved
on the Quebec Central since.

THAT MISSING \$10,000.

Toronto, April 21.—The detectives

Merchant's Bank, comes up for a hear-
ing next Friday, they will be in pos-
session of the missing lot of one thou-
sand \$10 bills.

Newport News, Va., April 21.—Cisse
Loftus, the English music hall singer,
who is resting at a hotel while wait-
ing for a trial, suffered an attack
of vertigo. She was standing over the
string piece when the attack came
upon her and falling, she rolled over-
board. Coxswain Deim, of the United
States training ship Monongahela,
leaped into the water and effected a
rescue.

SWEETHEARTS OF FIFTY YEARS

AGO WED.
Indianapolis, April 21.—Wm. D. Wes-
terfield, a wealthy Buchanan county farm-
er, aged 74, and Mrs. Helen J. Con-
way, of New York, aged 73, were mar-
ried at the home of Mr. Westerfield
yesterday. The bride having come from
her home in New York. Fifty years
ago they were sweethearts, but they
became estranged, and both married.
Westerfield's wife died two years ago
and about the same time Mr. Conway
died.

MURDEROUS ROBBERS.

New York, April 21.—Two masked
robbers fought a duel with Charles
Mann, watchman of the late Theodore
Havener's hotel, near the Rialto
way, N. J., early yesterday morn-
ing. After shooting him down they gagged
him, bound him to a tree, then broke
into the house and ransacked it, tak-
ing two sacksful of guns and valu-
able hunting trophies. On leaving they
forced the wounded watchman to ac-
company them. He was dragged for
over a mile through the woods. The
robbers finally bound him to a tree.
Farm hands found him after daybreak
almost dead from loss of blood and
exposure.

NO LOVE LOST

One of the Queerest Divorce
Cases on Record.

Miss Englehardt Won Her Bet That
She Would Marry Henry Cook.

New York, April 21.—Testimony in
one of the queerest divorce cases on
record has just been heard in Union
county, N. J., and the referee has re-
commended that the decree be grant-
ed.

The applicant was Henry Cook, a
wealthy farmer, living near Scotch
Plains. Mrs. Cook, who lives in
Brooklyn, has made no defense. Her
maiden name was Englehardt.

Cook testified that he never pro-
posed to his wife, nor did he have any
intention of doing so. He said he
had known her for several years, but
had never “kept company” with her.
Her relatives, he said, teased the wo-
man, saying that he would never
marry her. She made a wager that he
would.

New Year's day ten years ago, he
called, and Miss Englehardt gave him
liquor and then took him to the home
of Rev. Mr. Loche. She said, “Now,
we are going in here to get married.”
“No, I don't want to,” he replied.
“But I say you must,” she said.

Mr. Loche performed the ceremony.
After the ceremony the bride and
bridegroom went to the home of her
parents, and there the newly-made
bride said: “Now we are married, you
go back to Scotch Plains and attend
to your business and I shall go home.
Good-bye.” He had seen her but once
and then for a moment by chance.

Ministers of Fresno, Cal., will send a

The Central Canada Fire Insurance
Company has been purchased by the
Manitoba Assurance Company.

Some 700 miners have already left
Dawson for Cape Nome, and thou-
sands more are preparing to go.

New York State Democrats will meet
on June 6 to elect delegates to the na-
tional convention at Kansas City.

Mayor George A. Chase, of Preston,
was nominated for the Commons by
the Conservatives of South Waterloo.

Gov. Roosevelt has signed a bill
passed by the New York Legislature
authorizing separate schools for colored
children.

The work of procuring in Canada re-
counts for the British and colonial
cavalry forces in South Africa is pro-
gressing favorably.

Demas, one of the best known
politicians in the south, is dead. De-
mas was a prominent figure in re-
construction times.

Cincinnati Presbyterians have chosen
a delegation to the general assembly
opposed to Briggs, McGiffert, Hill-
is and creed revision.

Wm. Gallagher, formerly a resident
of Belleville, who was badly scalded
a week ago by the explosion of a boiler,
has died of his injuries.

The Northwest Transportation Com-
pany, or Beatty line, of Sarnia, and
the Northern Navigation Company, of
Collingwood, have not amalgamated,
as was reported a few days ago.

Frank Nichol, the acrobat who broke
his neck while performing in a New
York theater on Tuesday afternoon, is
improving at Bellevue Hospital. He is
comatose and chats with his friends.

Harry Gibbs, who, during a game
of “craps” on Good Friday, at Toronto,
tried to settle a dispute with Thomas
Brown by stabbing him in the head,
has been sent to the Central Prison
for six months.

The Tyrell exploring party, from
Winnipeg, Man., with whom is Arch-
deacon Lofthouse, reached Fort Chip-
ewyan, on Lake Athabasca, on March
19. They covered 430 miles on snow-
shoes in 17 days.

Berlin reports allege that rich new
diamond fields have been discovered in
German Southwest Africa, which have
been gobbled up by the De Beers Min-
ing Company, of Kimberley, to prevent
their development.

Mr. Justice Davidson has decided in
the case of Montreal against the street
railway company that the city can-
not claim a percentage on the earn-
ings of the company's lines outside the
corporation limits.

James Campbell, 49 years old, has
been sentenced to six months in jail
by Magistrate Scott, of Leamington,
for begging. The old man claims he
was simply borrowing money to pay
some trifling debts.

At Bluefield, W. Va., John Peters
(colored), charged with assaulting a
white girl, was captured by the aid of
bloodhounds, and placed in jail. Thurs-
day night he was dragged out by a
mob, shot to death, and then hanged.

In the case of Collier vs. the Mich-
igan Central Railway, tried at Sand-
wich, Martin J. Collier brought action
for damages against the railway for
the death of his son Arthur, who was
killed by yard engine last August.
The jury gave plaintiff a verdict for
\$2,000.

The American Bridge Company, in-
corporated at Trenton, N. J., a few
days ago, with a nominal capital of
\$100,000, which may be increased to
\$700,000, is said to include most of
the prominent steel bridge manufac-
turing companies of the country.

Hon. Sydney Fisher has received a
cable from Lord Strathcona stating
that while there were indications of
foot and mouth disease in United
States cattle at Denford, England,
the disease was understood to have
been communicated by butchers who
had been in contact with Argentine
cattle, and it is not considered neces-
sary to prohibit importation of cat-
tle from the United States.

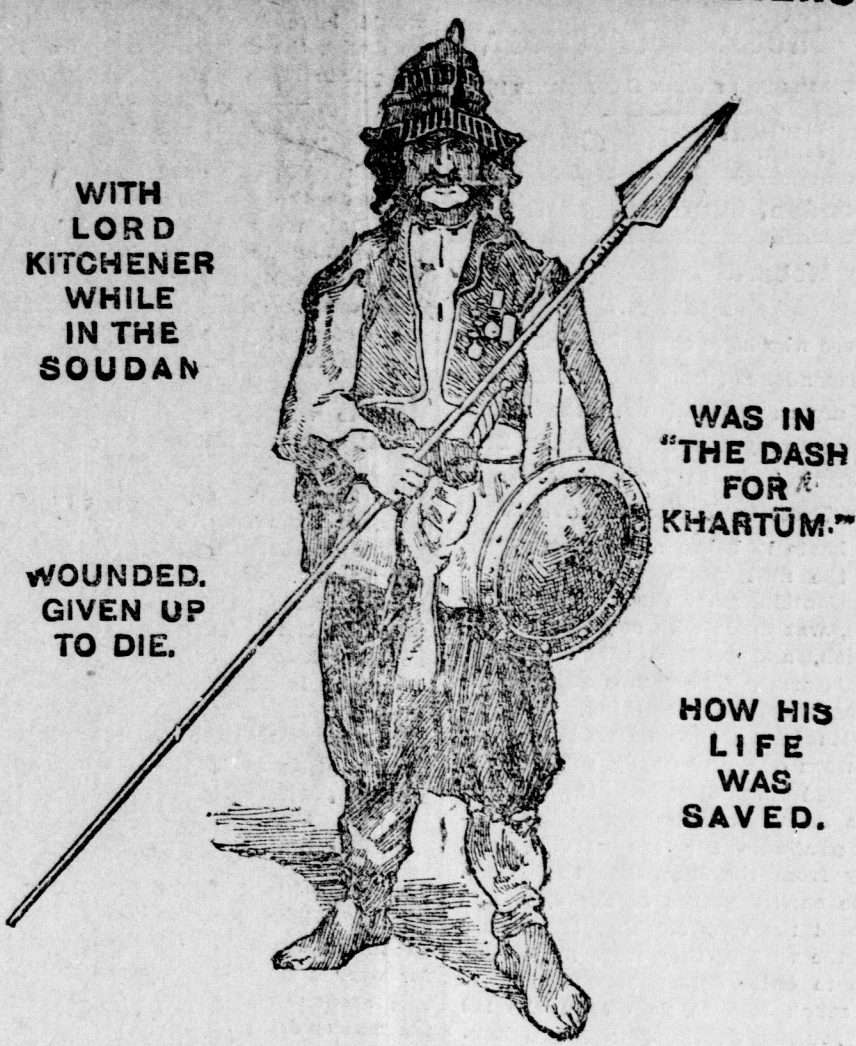
WON HIS BET AND DIED.
