



FLOODS IN QUEBEC.

Several Important Bridges Swept Away-Drummond Railway Bridge Shifted.

Quebec, April 21.-The recent rains and warm weather have caused floods on nearly all the rivers on both sides of the St. Lawrence. The water has risen on the Chaudiere River four feet higher than the highest mark recorded.

The iron bridge of the Drummond Railway at Chaudiere has moved eight inches on its piers. The old wooden bridge at St. Ronald has been carried away.

At Beauce Junction the extensive bridge of the Quebec Central Railway is threatened with destruction.

The water has risen especially high in the Etchemin River and has carried away the Quebec Central bridge at St. Anselme. A bridge was carried away in the same manner in 1896 at this point, and to withstand such strains the new bridge was made strong and built four feet above the previous high water mark. It was a very fine structure of steel, and as a result of its carrying away no trains have moved on the Quebec Central since.




