

Mr. Dunlop was tendered an ovation when he arose to accept the nomination. He was more than proud, he said, to be received as he had been. There was nothing in the present government to recommend them to the honest electorate. Not one pledge made to the eople had been carried out. One thing hey had done, and that was to spend lots of money. For business reasons he had desired to withdraw. He asked for honest work on the part of every Conservative. Should he be elected by a dishonorable vote he would not feel like retaining the seat. Referring to the enthusiasm prevailing, Mr. Dunlop said he would be almost inhuman f he did not accept the nomination

Upon motion of Dr. Roome, seconded by Mr. Gough, the nomination was made unanimous.

Mr. James Clancy, M. P., briefly because he had to catch a train. He boasted of being a Middlesex boy, and went on to say that in his belief it only needed a proper effort to re-deem the west riding. They prominsult to the intelligence of his hearers to repeat that these men had abandoned every principle in office that they had hitherto professed. Mr. Clarke claimed that Canadian interests had een needlessly sacrificed and betrayed in the matter of preferential trade, and stated that while in opposition Liberals had fought everything that today was a factor in the progress of Canada.

Mr. Thomas Beattle, M.P., in she course of his remarks, charged that Mr. Laurier never had any intention of sending the contingent to South Africa until compelled to by the row which Sir Charles Tupper had raised. And having sent them out, they had sent stuff to starve them on. He strongly urged the delegates to be constantly on the watch against corruption, and said that a gang of thieves would be found going about the country. He gave an experience of his own, where a Grit personator had been caught in Brantford, and said it was impossible to have such mer punished, because of the fact that magistrates and crown attorneys were friends of the government, and did not do their duty. Bail was taken for offenders who gave wrong names, and were never heard from again.

Danville, Pa., Oct. 9.-The confession of a murderer in the west promises to clear up the mystery of a horrible murder committed in this country 27 years ago. The confession, which is that of one I. W. Keller, who was recently executed in Oklahoma, is to the effect that he had murdered seven persons, among them being a man at Maus-

dale, this county. The news has produced the greatest excitement in the quiet hamlet for the twofold reason that a murder was committed there which has never been satisfactorily cleared up and that such a man as I. W. Keller, actually lived in the vicinity at the time.

The murder near Mausdale was known as the "mystery of the mine." In 1873 the body of Bernard Westdossel was discovered in an abandoned mine. The evidences of murder were plain, robbery being the object. Westdossel who had been a lieutenant in the Prussian army, was studying for the priest-
