last night is now over the Ottawa valley
and has caused light snow in Northern
Ontario. The pressure continues very
high over the western part of the continent.

Temple banquet hall on Tuesday even-
ing, Feb. 27.

There is excellent out-of-door skating
at the Blackfriars rink, near the bridge. A
children's masquerade carnival is an-
nounced for Saturday afternoon, with
prizes and cheap admission.

Through the kindness of Mr. Tripp,
the children of the Protestant Orphan
Home enjoyed a most delightful sleigh
ride on Saturday afternoon, for which the
trustees are very grateful.

The evangelistic services in Walling-
ton Street Methodist Church are being
largely attended, and are proving very
profitable and successful. Evangelist Park
and wife are doing very effective work.

The special services which have been
held in Adelaide Street Baptist Church
during the past two weeks are proving
very encouraging. The enthusiasm grows,
and the talks by Pastor Minnell are listened
to with deep interest.

The regular meeting of Somerset Coun-
cil, Royal Templars, will be held on Sat-
urday evening this week, instead of Friday
evening, at Somerset Hall at 8 o'clock.
Members and those desiring to join will
please bear the change in mind.

Sarah Cawley, relict of the late W.
Clarke, formerly of Biddulph township,
died in Mount Hope, this city, the other
day, and her remains were interred in St.
Peter's Cemetery, Biddulph. She was 73
years of age and was one of the first settlers
of the township.

A meeting of the delegates to the
Grand Lodge, S. O. E., to be held in To-
ronto next month, was called by the
worthy district deputy, Bro. Joseph
Hook, at Piccadilly Lodge on Mon-
day evening, when a number of im-
portant questions were discussed for Grand
Lodge purposes, and a district deputy
chosen for recommendation.

At a united meeting of the trustees and
other officials of the quarterly board of
Askin Street Methodist Church a unanim-
ous invitation was given by a standing
vote to the pastor, Rev. Thos. Cullen, to
remain for a second year. The church is in
a prosperous state, the congregations are
large, and during the last two months
about 35 members have been added as the
result of special services.

The Windsor Record says that a young
man named Thomas Walker, of London, was
arrested here Tuesday with a Molson's bank
draft for \$550. He told a straight story,
however, about his bank account in London,
which the chief verified by telephone, and
he was allowed to go. Walker said he
supposed \$550 was more money than many
people in Windsor had ever seen, and no
wonder they wanted to look him up.

The stock of A. Kofe, of this city,
valued at \$12,730 85, and comprised of
dress goods and silks, staples, small wares,
general drygoods, shop furniture and chat-
tels, was sold at auction by Mr. J. W.
Jones yesterday afternoon. Hodgins Bros.,
of Clinton, were the purchasers at 60
cents on the dollar. The stock of J. M.
Doyle, of Chatham, was sold to K. H.
Clemie, of this city, at 51½ cents on the
dollar.

Mr. James Ballantyne, of 529 Talbot
street, met with a rather peculiar accident
the other day. He had been troubled for
some time with the grip, which finally
settled in his foot. Considerable pain re-
sulted, and to alleviate his sufferings Mr.
Ballantyne used turpentine. After follow-
ing this course of procedure one day, Mr.
Ballantyne went to light his pipe before
his hands were thoroughly dry, when his
hands suddenly caught fire, and were
severely burned.

The will of the late Thomas Palmer,
of Bayham, Ont., who died last week at
the age of 92 years, provides that the London
Asylum for the Insane, the Toronto
Asylum for the Insane, the Brantford
Asylum for the Blind, and the Deaf and
Dumb Institute at Belleville are to receive

\$800 each, for which they must pay 6 per
cent. interest, three of them to his daugh-
ter Catharine and the other to his grandson
Thomas during their lives. The balance of
his property goes to children and grand-
children. The will has created much sur-
prise.

The many friends of Mrs. Mary Fraser,
relict of the late Donald Fraser, Petty
street, East Williams, will regret to hear
of her death, which occurred in this city
on Feb. 13, at the residence of Mr. George
Dowling, 606 Princess avenue. About six
weeks ago deceased came to visit her
nephew, the late Mr. W. J. Kerr, and
while spending the evening with her niece,
Mrs. Dowling, became ill with congestion,
from which she appeared to be rapidly re-
covering. Death was due to heart failure.
She was born in Inverness-shire, Scotland,
in 1828, and came to Canada in 1861. She
leaves three sons, Hugh, Finley and John,
besides a large number of friends, who will
miss her kind and pleasant face. Her re-
mains were interred at Nairn Cemetery,
the bearers being Mr. Neil McTaggart,
John Clark, Wm. McKenzie, Geo. Wyatt,
Hugh McCallum and Alex. Rose.

A Brilliant Spectacle.

The most brilliant display of aurora
borealis witnessed in this city within a
year was observed last night between 10
and 11 o'clock. It was indeed a striking
spectacle. At times all the colors of the
rainbow were visible. Again the lights
were almost blood red, then changing in
an instant to marine blue.

The Board of Works.

The matter of painting the fair build-
ings came up at last night's meeting of No.
2 committee. The engineer in his recom-
mendation placed the cost at \$1,100, and
half to be borne by the Western Fair
Association. Ald. Garratt held that the
engineer had exceeded his duty as far as
the estimate of cost was concerned. It
would give unreliable painters a chance to
tender on the engineer's estimate. The
engineer stated that the first question
usually put to him was the price, and that
his motive for putting it in. Again he
had been told that the Western Fair
Board would not bear their share of the
expense. The matter was laid over
until the Fair Board could be
heard from. The committee decided to
meet at the foot of Richmond street to-
day, at 10:30 a.m., to inspect the falling
away of the sewer mouth. Progress will
be reported on the matter of a stone
crusher, until the engineer receives tenders
for stones suitable for crushing. Engineer
Graydon reported that he had, with some
hesitation, given W. D. Buckle a permit to
move an old frame shanty from Waterloo
and Central avenue to Piccadilly and
William streets. He further stated
that the place was formerly a pest-
house in the days when London
was a garrison town, and several persons
objected to the place being moved into
their neighborhood. Yesterday Medical
Health Officer Hutchinson condemned the
building as unfit for habitation, and in view
of that fact the permit to move the place
was rescinded on motion of Ald. Garratt.

The next meeting of the board will be
held on Feb. 24, at 7:45 a.m. There
were present Ald. T. Jones (chairman),
Garratt, Shaw, Drenay, Taylor, Clerk Bell,
Engineer Graydon and Street Commis-
sioner Owen.

Charges Against a School Teacher.

At the meeting of No. 1 committee of
the school board last night Principal
Stewart of the Talbot street school was
charged by Mr. P. Lewis with having "un-
lawfully and brutally" punished his son
Alfred "without any just cause for such
ungentlemanly and dastardly punishment."
Principal Stewart, Mr. Lewis and the boy
were present, and all were heard. It ap-
pears that the youth suffers from deafness,
unknown to Mr. Stewart, and this prac-
tically led to the trouble. Mr. Stewart
denied the boy's statement that he was
struck by the principal's hand on the
head, but Mr. Lewis did not
wish to press this charge. The boy
had been struck with a pointer, across
the legs, leaving black marks there.
For some days afterwards, Dr. Campbell
moved "that, having heard the statement
of Mr. Stewart and Mr. Lewis regarding
the punishment of Albert Lewis, we find
the punishment given the boy was not too
severe for the offense committed, and we
would call the principal's attention to the
relation existing between punishment by a
stick." The majority of the members did
not think that enough justice was done to
Mr. Lewis, and it was finally agreed to
report that the committee found that the
principal did not intend to injure the boy
in any way, but that he overlooked the
rules in using a pointer, and that in future
the principal carry out the rule in refer-
ence to punishment by a stick. Mr. Jeffrey
reported on behalf of the sub-committee on
the proposal to establish transition classes
from the kindergarten to the public schools.
The report recommended that the
transition classes be established in
connection with the junior public school
instead of the kindergarten. By this
means the over-crowded junior classes can
be relieved. The plan will be recommended
to the board. It will be recommended
that one dictionary be purchased for each
school. On motion of Trustee Griffin it
will be further recommended that a com-
mercial form be established in connection
with the public schools, said form to be
located in the vacant room at Princess
avenue school. There were present:

Griffin, Murphy, Craig, Campbell, Wilkie,
Saunders, McRobert, Principal Merchant
and Secretary McElheran.
