LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—The Protestant Protective Association is holding a session in this city.

—Gas accounts must be paid by tomorrow to save the usual discount allowed.

—Miss Annie Beverage, of Point Edward, has accepted a position as typewriter in the office of Reid Bros., city.

Supt. Smith, of the London Street Railway, who has been on a few days' visit to Toronto, returned home last night.

—Leon Washburn's circus and menagerie will give two performances, afternoon and evening, in London, on Wednesday, May 3.

—President Miller says the lessees of the Port Stanley road feel sore over the amount of freight given them by London shippers.

—Mr. Ed. Howie has so far recovered from the injuries sustained by a recent kick from a horse as to be able to walk about.

—Lieut. N. Bowman will leave for London to take a month's course in order to qualify himself for his position.—[Berlin Record.]

—Auctioneer Cooper disposed of the stock of Wm. McH. Allister yesterday to Mr. Henry Macklin at 27 cents on the dollar.

—Miss Bertha Todd, of South London, late of T. A. Mara & Co., left today for Stratford, where she takes the position of cashier for W. S. Reid, drygoods merchant.

—Auctioneer Jones sold a 60-acre farm yesterday—southeast part of lot 4, con. 1, Westminster. It was a mortgage sale, and Mrs. Charles McClary, city, was the buyer, at \$8,250.

—Mr. Adam Beck shipped about 30 of his fine-bred hackney horses to the New York market Monday, where they will be disposed of. Mr. Beck has also gone to New York.

—P. C. Campbell is confined to the house with a very sore hand. It was thought a day or so ago that the member would have to be amputated, but yesterday it was a little better.

—Hugh Dick, a lad employed at Somerville's gun factory in the East End, got his hand badly crushed in a roller yesterday afternoon. Drs. Gardiner and Engle, of this city, were called in, and the lad was conveyed to his home on Dundas street east.

—Wm. C. Jordan, was arrested yesterday afternoon on a charge of assaulting and obstructing P. C. Addison in the discharge of his duty. The assault is alleged to have occurred on Saturday afternoon in front of the Walsh House, on King street, when Addison was arresting a man. At to-day's Police Court Jordan was bailed until Friday.

—The lecture in the Centennial Methodist Church last night was well attended. It was under the auspices of the Y. P. S. E. of this church, and Mr. Wesley J. Cunningham was the lecturer. He is an entertaining and instructive talker, and his recent trip through the different European countries was his subject. Mr. Henry J. Jones occupied the chair, and Mr. Fred Hardey presided at the organ.

—The executive committee of the Local Christian Endeavor Union met in Victoria Hall last evening. The committee decided to appoint an organization and visiting committee, composed of the following members: Misses Jewell, Harwood, Smith and Carson; Messrs. Doherty, McMullen, Cunningham, Kirkpatrick, McDermid and Clark. The fifth anniversary of the union will be held May 30. The programme was left with a committee to arrange. Middlesex county Christian Endeavorers held their second annual convention at Parkhill May 8 and 9.

—President Miller, of the syndicate, does not entertain very bright hopes of a railway from Tilsonburg to the lake. Mr. Bicknell and he have both been over the ground, and one strong quality of the country that impressed them very much was the mud. “The people are very anxious to have a railroad down there,” he said, “but they will have to put up a bonus of just twice as much as the \$140,000 already offered; and then I don't think the road would pay running expenses after it was started. If the L. and P. S. won't, then it can hardly be expected that the Tilsonburg line would.”

—A correspondent writes: Two well-known druggists of this city on Good Friday took a trip with a canoe, two guns and a valise well filled with all the delicacies of the season. At Ingersoll they carried the canoe and outfit to the River Thames and set off for London with all the expectations of arriving home early with a boat load of game, fish, etc. They shot several of the ducks until one was reached near Dorchester. After getting over the dam they struck a whirlpool which turned the boat like a merry-go-round. It capsize and the guns sank in twenty feet of water. Their lunch was gone and the excursionists wended their way to neighboring mill where they stood for some hours before the furnace fire drying their clothes. They narrowly escaped with their lives, the water being so cold that they were in danger of cramps. The couple took the evening train for London.

A Large Shipment.

The largest shipment of burial caskets ever sent from the east was that made yesterday by the Globe Casket Company of this city, to Vancouver, B. C. It comprised between 80 and 90 cases of coffins, requiring ten lorries to convey the load to the station.

Going to England.

Capt. Cartwright, of the Infantry Barracks, London, has been selected to undertake a course of military instruction with the regular forces in England. He sails from Halifax on the Vancouver on Saturday next. He will report in London, Eng., where he will receive further instructions.

Wanted in Windsor.

A Windsor dispatch says: Morley H. Dozier, of Galt, in attendance at “D” Military School, London, in February last was in Windsor and bought a diamond ring for \$110 from Vivian & Morris. He

didn't pay for the ring, and has not done so yet, and it is alleged that in purchasing it he made many misrepresentations. Last night Chief Mills went to London and arrested the young soldier, returning with him this morning. Dozier, appearing before Judge Cheyne this morning in full uniform, charged with obtaining goods under false pretenses. He was remanded until Tuesday, April 25.

A Picarescent Gathering.

The Palace Dancing Academy presented a brilliant appearance last evening, when Messrs. Dayton & McCormick held their season's closing “At Home.” The pretty hall was comfortably filled, among the guests being several from Toronto, Stratford, Woodstock, Ingersoll, St. Marys and St. Thomas, in addition to those from the city. Prof. Dayton's orchestra was present and provided in faultless style a programme that included all the latest waltzes, while Mr. James McCormick, as director of ceremonies, discharged the duties of his office with his accustomed grace. The toilets of the ladies were charming. At midnight supper was served, followed by a continuation of the dancing and the morning waltzes well advanced before the guests took their departure after spending one of the most delightful evenings of the winter season just closed.

“Side-Tracked.”

“Side-Tracked” was presented at the Grand last evening to a top-heavy house, and thoroughly delighted the friends of the generally well patronized “upper circle.” The play introduces some very good mechanical effects, especially the railroad scene, which was wonderfully realistic. Ford, Dresden; A. L. Russell, M.A., B.D., Exeter; Rev. G. H. Thompson, Bryanston; Rev. J. W. Annis, M.A., Chatham; Rev. Wm. Quance, Dorchester Station; and Rev. G. R. Sanderson, B.D., city.

Death of Mr. J. A. Abbott.

After lingering between life and death for a number of days, Mr. Joseph A. Abbott, of 343 Dundas street, died last evening about 7 o'clock after an illness of four weeks from the effects of a grippé, which settled on the brain. Deceased was a native of this city and a son of Mr. Hudson G. Abbott, carriage-maker, and grandson of the assistant city clerk, and at the time of his death was 26 years and 3 months old. Mr. Abbott had been for a number of years traveler for the Hobbs Hardware Company, and was very successful in his occupation. He was a regular churchman and actively connected with the Sunday school. In July last Mr. Abbott was married to Miss Minnie Moore, a resident of this city, who has the sympathy of the community in her sad bereavement. The funeral will take place on Saturday.

An Exciting Runaway.

A horse belonging to J. T. Smith, furniture dealer, runaway in East London this morning. It was attached to a dray loaded with crockery, and both crockery and dray were entirely demolished. At Adelaide street, on Dundas, the horse, with the remnant of the vehicle, took the sidewalk on the north side and continued on until Mr. Morrison's store was reached, damaging Mr. Murray Anderson's fence on the way. At Morrison's it undertook to get onto the middle of the road again, and to do so it was necessary to jump over a horse owned by Dr. Gardiner, which attempt was unsuccessful, and the result was a mixture of both horses and rigs in a heap on the street, with Dr. Gardiner underneath. Recovering their feet both horses ran away, Smith's running to its stable and Dr. Gardiner's bringing up against a tree on Elizabeth street, badly breaking the buggy. The doctor escaped with some severe bruises and a badly skinned elbow.

Lee-Smith.

Christ Church was the scene of a very pleasant wedding yesterday afternoon, when Rev. Edwin Lee, incumbent of the Episcopal Church at Princeton, and a graduate of Huron College, was married to Miss Florian Smith, daughter of Rev. Canon Smith, rector of Christ Church. The edifice was crowded long before the ceremony by friends and well-wishers of the young couple. Rev. Rural Dean Smith, rector of Morpeth, performed the ceremony, assisted by Rev. A. H. Rhodes, assistant at Christ Church. The bridesmaid was Miss Bertha Smith, sister of the bride, and Mr. Arthur Shore, of Huron College, was best man. Mr. James Harwood, of Huron College, and Mr. Ernest Smith, of Morpeth, officiated as ushers. A wedding breakfast and a reception were afterwards held at the rectory, at which a number of guests were present from Stratford, Brantford and other places. The collection of gifts was very large, and contained many handsome and useful presents. Mr. and Mrs. Lee left last evening on a honeymoon trip east.

“Shakespeare.”

The renowned orator, Col. Robert G. Ingersoll, will lecture at the Grand Saturday night—one of the three addresses he will give in Canada. The subject is “Shakespeare,” and is therefore purely secularian. Says the Globe of his appearance in Toronto: “Col. Robert G. Ingersoll, the famous American orator, lectured last night at the Auditorium upon ‘Shakespeare.’ The subject is old and familiar, but age cannot wither it nor custom stale its infinite variety. Besides, the lecturer is an ardent admirer of nature, has a keen appreciation of the beautiful, is a brilliant word painter, and uses perfect illustrations. And so he was heard with rare attention to the end by an audience which nearly filled the Auditorium. The lecturer was introduced by Mr. Charles R. Pope, United States consul, himself no mean orator. Col. Ingersoll plunged at once into his subject. The ignorant village in which Shakespeare was born and his lowly parentage, led naturally to some observations on the often-commonplace surroundings of genius. Some biographers have endeavored to show that he was patronized by Queen Elizabeth, but the orator was glad to say there was not a shadow of proof of it. (Applause.) No emperor on a throne ever could patronize William Shakespeare. (Applause.) He
