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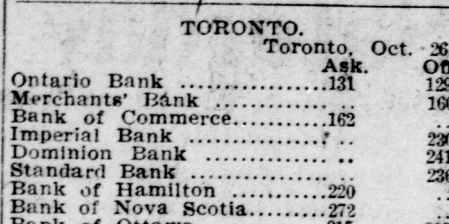

Mr. Hyman Addresses the G.T.R. Carshops Employees

The Liberal Candidate Given a Very Cordial Reception.

Shows How the G. T. P. Bargain Will Benefit Railway Men.

And Answers an Attack Made on Him by the Local Conservative Organ.

Hon. Charles S. Hyman paid a visit to the Grand Trunk car works at noon today and was afforded an opportunity of addressing between two and three hundred of the employees. It was the first time the member for London had such a privilege, and he was accorded a very warm reception. He spoke for twenty minutes on a number of matters of special interest to the employees of the railway.

Mr. Hyman said, in the first place, as chairman of the redistribution committee of the House of Commons, he took great pleasure in seeing East London where it should have always belonged for the purposes of parliamentary elections—a part of the city. In Dominion elections for a great many years East London was a part of East Middlesex, the point being raised that the proper place for it was to be with the city of London. He went on to say that the present election is one in which the employees of the Grand Trunk Railway are specially interested.

When the question was raised of connecting the Northwest Territories with the eastern part of Canada, Mr. Hyman said he should have always been as well for the whole country. The Grand Trunk Railway spread all over the most every hamlet, reaching all the corners of the province, and the completion of the new line this section is in direct touch with the rapidly growing west. There was another reason.

Will Aid Car Works.
One of the clauses of the contract between the Government and the Grand Trunk Railway, the railway which the Trunk Pacific provided that the railway must place within seven years rolling stock to the extent of \$20,000,000 on the new line. This means that the Grand Trunk will buy or build the rolling stock to the extent of \$20,000,000 worth of which is to be made up of \$10,000,000 worth of new stock and \$10,000,000 worth of old stock. The agreement did not mean that the Grand Trunk was to provide the new stock, but that it was to provide the old stock. Mr. Hyman said it impressed him, representing the Government, that if the Grand Trunk Railway was going to build the rolling stock it would naturally use the facilities that it has at the present time and enlarge them.
