CZAR DISMISSES KUROPATKIN IN DISGRACE; LIVEVITCH TAKES OVER DESPERATE TASK; JAPS HANG TO HEELS OF REMNANT

Railway Is Reported Cut and Russians May Be Enveloped Before Harbin Can Be Reached.

Russians Burn Stores at Their IF NOT ALREADY CUT, AND CHI-Last Manchurian Stronghold and Take to the Hills.

ST. PETERSBURG. MARCH 17 1:05 P.M. - WITH THE JAPANESE IN THE RETREAT FROM MOSCOW, HANGING ON THE HEELS AND WITH KUTUSOFF'S COSSACKS FLANKS OF THE REMNANTS OF HARASSING THE STARVING. THE BROKEN, DEFEATED RUS- FREEZING FRENCHMEN, WAS SIAN ARMY, GEN. KUROPATKIN, HARDLY AS EAD OR DANGER-THE OLD IDOL OF THE PRIVATE OUS SOLDIER, HAS BEEN DISMISSED AND DISGRACED, AND GEN. LINE-VITCH, COMMANDER OF THE FIRST ARMY, IS APPOINTED TO SUCCEED HIM IN COMMAND OF ALL THE RUSSIAN LAND AND SEA FORCES OPERATING AGAINST JAPAN. THE WORD DISGRACE IS WRITTEN IN LARGE LETTERS IN THE LACONIC IM-PERIAL ORDER GAZETTED THIS MORNING, WHICH CONTAINS NOT A SINGLE WORD OF PRAISE, AND ALSO DISPOSES OF THE RUMOR THAT KUROPATKIN HAD ASKED TO BE RELIEVED.

The Russian military annals contain no more bitter imperial rebuke. While it was known that the war council had already decided to supplant Kuropatkin after the Mukden disaster, the decision to confer the task of saving the remainder of the army on Linevitch in the very midst of its flight although bruited last night, came as a surprise.

It transpires that Emperor Nicholas and War Minister Sakharoff, determined that the step was necessary, when it became apparent yesterday morning that Kuropatkin, while concentrating for a stand at Tie Pass, seemed unaware that the Japanese had worked around westward again, and practically allowed himself to be sur-

Old reports brought by Gen. Gripenberg, regarding Kuropatkin's failing mentality also had influence. Under the circumstances, therefore, it was considered imperative, in view of the exceedingly perilous position of the army to turn over its command to Linevitch, who alone had been able to bring off his army in order after the battle of Mukden. His record during the Chinese war had also demonstrated his capacity as a commander. Kurepatkin will return to St. Petersburg

Gen. Kuropatkin's military career was a notable one. During 1876 and he was officer of the general staff in Turkestan, and during the next two years was chief of the Asiatic bureau of the main army. His most notable military exploits are as follows: Was aide to Gen. Skobeloff during the war with the Turks from 1877 to 1885. He took an active part, and the celebrated blockade of Plevna, in 1885, and was with the Russian commander-in-chief when he crossed the Balkans in 1877, and took part in the battle of Sheinova. He was Skobeleff's chief of staff during the conquest of Turkomania in 1881, and conducted the expedition against the rebel chieftain, Akhal Teke. n 1881-82.

Kuropatkin also commanded in Turkestan against Bucharia in 1867 and against Kokand in 1876. Since 1901 he has been general of infantry, and since 1898 Minister of War of the Russian army. He was born March 17, 1848. He s the possessor of many decorations, both Russian and foreign, for his military knowledge and exploits.

Tokio, March 17, 9 a.m. - A telegram received today from army headquarters in the field says: "The railway station at Tieling is a splendid structure, and its arrangements equal those of the station at Liao Yang.

"The enemy's provisions and fodder, piled around this station, were set on fire, and two-thirds of the material was destroyed. We have captured numerous spoils, but have had no time investigate them. "A great number of prisoners have been taken in the direction of the right


