

Day That Germany Reaches This Goal, Race for Naval Supremacy Will End.

Erlin, Aug. 25.—The day on which Germany discovers an efficient type of aerial cruiser the naval rivalry between herself and England will cease. She will abandon the building of Dreadnoughts, and will concentrate on the construction of aerial battleships. At the present moment, however,
