HENRI ROCHEFORT ARDENT PATRIOT DIES IN PARIS

Served Many Terms in Prison as a Result of Radical Views.
Was Banished Once, and Was Transported to Caledonia Another Time.

Aix-les-Bains, France, July 1.—Henri Rochefort, for a long series of years one of the most prominent figures in French political life, died here today, from a complication of maladies, at the age of 83.
The real name of Henri Rochefort was the Marquis Victor Henri de Rochefort-Lucy, and he was the son of the Marquis Claude Louis Marie de Rochefort-Lucy, who was a most successful author of light plays.
Henri Rochefort was a Parisian of the Parisians, and he was born in the French capital and passed the greater part of his life there. He took part in its defence against the Prussians in 1870-71 as a member of the Government of the National Defence, and at other times worked as a municipal official, as a deputy, as a journalist and as a playwright.

His ardent patriotism often led him to excesses in the expression of his opinions, and brought him into conflict with the law. In 1873 he was condemned to deportation, and was transported to Noumea, in Caledonia, whence he with several companions in captivity managed to escape in 1874, but was unable to re-enter his beloved France on account of the general amnesty in 1880.
Rochefort was a most picturesque figure, and was always ready to defend his own honor or that of his country, and for this reason engaged in a large number of duels.
Rochefort Banished.
In the General Boulanger agitation of 1888, Rochefort threw in his lot with that soldier, whom he hoped to see not only dictator of France, but of Europe. It is charged that he was getting "well out of the affair" when Boulanger's plans were nipped in the bud, because he claimed that the general had turned out to be a weak-minded man. Boulanger committed suicide, and Rochefort was banished, living in London from 1889 to 1895, when he returned to Paris. He served a number of terms in prison for his attacks on judges and the law generally. His transportation to Noumea was on a charge of being connected with the Commune, but in that case he suffered wrongfully. In fact, urged, he used all his influence in attempts to persuade the colleagues on The Marseillaise not to support the movement.
Rochefort was the editor of La Patrie. He served on the staff of Figaro early in his career as a journalist, established The Lanterne in 1869, The Marseillaise in 1869, and L'Intransigeant in 1880.

AVIATOR CRASHED INTO FENCE AT PORT ELGIN

Was Hurl'd Twenty Feet, But Escaped With Slight Injuries—Several Spectators Hurt.

Port Elgin, July 1.—Aviator Morris was hurled twenty feet today when his Curtiss biplane ran into a fence as he was descending. The plane was badly smashed, but Morris escaped with slight injuries.
Five thousand people who were here for the Dominion Day celebration saw the accident.
Scores of people were leaning over the fence, and a mad rush occurred when it was seen that the machine was out of control. E. R. Sayles received a nasty scalp wound, but his injuries are not serious.
Mr. Morris stated that wind currents were responsible for the accident, as they carried the machine too near the fence before alighting.
The aeroplane is badly wrecked, and poets four feet in the ground were torn out by the impact, which was the unfortunate conclusion of an otherwise successful flight.

LLOYD GEORGE PLAYED UNCTUOUS MAN HUNTERS

Scathing Attack on Marconi Critics Was Cheered at National Liberal Club Luncheon.

London, July 1.—Mr. Lloyd George hit back at his critics in the Marconi business at a luncheon given by Sir Rufus Isaacs at the National Liberal Club today.
Hon. Winston Churchill sat next to the chancellor.
After testifying that the more reputable and more honorable section of the Tory press had declined to join the "unctuous, famous man-hunt," Mr. Lloyd George said he wished he could say that of the Tory party in the Commons.
He and Sir Rufus Isaacs through the dark and dreary winter had been silent, while calumny was hurled from every quarter at their heads. It was the chabbiest chapter in the history of any party. For months every dastardly and cowardly journalist of the Tory party was shooting poisoned darts, knowing their hands were tied. His hands were free now, free to shield and to smite.
His declaration was received by a tumult of cheers, and the chancellor then proceeded to give a foretaste of how he would smite, if necessary. When he heard Mr. Bonar Law saying that the ministers ought to be expelled from office who are guilty of indiscretion, and saw the Tory party rushing back from the Ascot races to pass a solemn vote of censure upon the semblance of gambling, it gave him an unpleasant cross-channel feeling. This enthusiasm for a current vernacular phrase was received with shrieks of laughter by the Liberals. It was characterized by the Tories as another instance of the chancellor's tendency at Limehouse.
