Herendsey Favorite As Plate Winner

Jumps Into Public Favor Ahead of Royal Visitor and Heath Bell.

Since Ontario, will be run today as the feature event of the opening. This race has been the talk of the whole province for over six months, and all arguments will be settled today.

Nine horses will start, representing six stables. The Seagram Stable will start Crown of Gold, the Thorncliffe Stable, Fuse, and the Livingston Stable, Moll Outpurse and Flia.

The Platters received their final preparation Friday morning at Woodbine. Royal Visitor, with Jockey Keogh in the saddle, and taking as a running mate, stepped 3/4 mile in 56.2, but at this point he again balked and almost pulled up to a walk, but got going quickly and went the 1/2 mile in 50.2.

Heath Bell has not been asked to do anything fast, but appeared to be in excellent condition.

Herendsey was let step along a nice easy mile. He was full of run and fighting for his head in 1:46. Resart, after the dummy event, went 3/4 mile in 50.2.

Fuse and Witch Flower were sent 1/2 mile in 50.2. Fuse appeared to be coughing when she left the track.

The Seagram pair, Crown of Gold and Moll Outpurse, were on the track, but were only galloped.

The Livingston trio, Flia, Ragged Robin and Moll Outpurse, ran a nice 1/2 mile in 49.

The Ontario Jockey Club will distribute \$118,000 in stakes and purses at this meeting, no purse being less than \$1,500. The Toronto Cup, to be run next Wednesday, has \$10,000 added, and is the richest stake of the meeting.
