In company with an Advertiser reporter Engineer Brazier inspected the cause of complaint this morning. The entire stretch of pavement was dotted with stones of various sizes pulled from the track allowance to either side. Some of these stones were imbedded into the pavement, and when dug out by the city engineer left depressions varying in size up to that of a baseball. He admitted to the reporter that if such a state of conditions continues the life of the road will be greatly shortened. Stones were noticed also along the Stanley street boulevards thrown up by passing vehicles.

To pass an auto standing on this narrow street, motorists must drive over the track allowance, which acts greatly in spreading the pebbles. City Engineer Brazier has instructed that an employee gather up the large stones from the track allowance to prevent further distribution. His services will be charged up to the general tax rate, and it is interesting to note that those aldermen who opposed city paving of the track allowance did so on the ground that the citizens' money should not be used in this way.
