

QUEBEC WOODMAN IS KILLED AS TREE FALLS

Went Alone Into Bush—Leaves Three Small Children.

MISSING TWO DAYS

Employer, Becoming Worried, Goes to Investigate Man's Absence.

St. Anne De La Perle, Que., March 12.—A gruesome discovery was made Friday in the bush, a short distance from this village, when the body of Octave Deveau, a local resident, was found crushed to death under a tree.

Deveau, who was 28 years of age, and a widower, having lost his wife six months ago, being left with three young children, of whom he was the sole support, had been soliciting employment for some time to provide for his small family. Last week, Conrad Tessier, a local lumberman, offered him employment to cut wood at a short distance from the village. Deveau accepted and left on Tuesday, expecting to return the same evening.

On Thursday he had not yet shown up, and finally yesterday Mr. Tessier, worried over the disappearance of his employee, proceeded to his timber limits, which are situated near the mountain. On arriving there, he found no one in the log cabin, and easily established that no one had been in the camp since a day or two.

He searched around, but failed to locate the missing man. Finally, as he was to return to the village, he saw an arm sticking out of the snow which had fallen during the storm of Wednesday last. The man was found there with a heavy tree across his chest. Deveau had apparently been dead since Tuesday.

He had suffered no injuries apart from that, but had been crushed to death by the tree which was cutting down. The scene was easily reconstructed, and apparently Deveau had struggled for some time to get away from there, but had been unable to do so.

The coroner's inquest was held Saturday by Dr. Vanasse, and after hearing a relation of the facts a verdict of accidental death was returned. It is understood that the three children, the oldest being 6 years of age, will be adopted by some local residents.

FINE SARNIA MAN \$500 IN "EXTRACT" CASE

S. Jacks Convicted On Charge of Keeping Liquor For Sale.

Sarnia, March 12.—Magistrate C. S. Woodrow Saturday afternoon assessed Samuel Jacks, the storekeeper, from whom the police seized over a thousand bottles of extract last week, \$500 and costs of \$43.83, following his conviction on a charge of keeping liquor for sale. With the conviction against this defendant, the charge against Mrs. Riva Jacks was not prosecuted.

In summing up, the magistrate expressed the conviction that a sale of extract to an Indian for consumption on the premises was proved, and pointed to the fact that within twelve months the defendant had purchased 40 gross of bottles of extract, while a leading grocer in the town had testified that normally, a gross would last him for seven or eight weeks.

A second charge of failing to keep a record of sales was enlarged for a week at the request of the crown attorney, who would not agree to the defending counsel's suggestion that the second charge be withdrawn. The seizures were made by Provincial officer Leslie Atkins.

SIX FISHERMEN DIE IN ATLANTIC STORM

Nova Scotia Schooner Helen Coolen Founders in Moun-tainous Sea.

SURVIVORS SAVED

Men Blown Off Vessel by Ninety-Mile-An-Hour Hurricane.

Halifax, N. S., March 12.—Four fishermen out of Gloucester and two out of Hubbards, N. S., went to their deaths in the southwesterly hurricane which swept the North Atlantic fishing grounds on Wednesday and Thursday. The crack Gloucesterman, Elizabeth Howard, barely saved herself from resting her bones on Sable Island, and the Hubbards schooner, Helen M. Coolen, foundered.

The story was brought yesterday by the Gloucester vessel which rescued the survivors of the Nova Scotia schooner and brought them to port.

John MacLeod, St. Peter's Canal, Cape Breton, James Murphy, Canoe N.S., Herbert Blondin, Newfoundland, and Miles O'Brien, Newfoundland, were swept overboard from the Elizabeth about 12:30 a.m. on Thursday, when their vessel fell off a heavy sea almost on her beam ends and was buried beneath tons of water from leeward.

Buried Beneath Sea.
Stewart Boutillier, Mill Cove, N.S., and Joseph Lant, West Dover, N.S., also went to their deaths about 10:30 p.m. Wednesday night, when the Helen M. Coolen was buried beneath a mountainous sea.

For four hours after the quadruple loss, Captain Daniel MacDonald of Bayfield, Antigonish County, N. S., and his crew of the Elizabeth Howard, drifted under barpoles before a 22-mile-an-hour hurricane, always near the fatal bars of Sable Island, where rest the Esperanto, Puritan, and many other brave fishermen. At last, on Friday, herself safe, the Howard came like a messenger from heaven to the rescue of the men of the Helen M. Coolen, who since the loss of their two shipmates, had battled in a leading and ruthless vessel to save their ship and themselves.

The Coolen beneath them was a broken raft and fast sinking. Howard came close by and the crew put off from the Coolen in their dories in heavy-running seas and found safety, as their own vessel lay awash and ready to sink.

The Elizabeth Howard sailed from Gloucester on a halibut trip on Feb. 5th.

Rudder Unworkable.
Meanwhile death had taken its toll from the Helen M. Coolen, Captain Arthur Fraick, Hackett's Cove, N.S. The Coolen sailed from Halifax Tuesday and anchored on the west bank that evening. Wednesday morning a southeast breeze struck them and increased all day. That night the hawser parted. The hail was put up, but was torn to pieces. It was hauled down and Stewart Boutillier, Joseph Lant and George Lant set out to lash it fast. They were facing aft when the vessel shipped a sea forward. It swept the deck in a torrent and Boutillier and Lant went with it, snoring, half stunned, clung to the vessel. The sea, which swept the men overboard, made the schooner's rudder unworkable and opened her seams.

No sail could be put on the vessel and she could not be steered. The Coolen drifted all day and through Thursday night, with seas opening and water pouring through.

On Friday morning the two hurricane-struck vessels came together.

COUNTERFEITING PLANT SEIZED IN MONTREAL

False Fifty-Cent Pieces Are Flooding the Dominion, Declare Detectives.

Montreal, March 12.—A counterfeiting plant for the making of 50 cent pieces, Canadian currency, was seized by the R.C.M.P. Saturday. The seizure was followed by the appearance before Judge Proulx of G. A. Brisson of this city and Al Marlotte of New York, the latter being arrested ten minutes after stepping from a New York train at Bonaventure depot Saturday morning.

Both prisoners were arraigned charged with counterfeiting, and remanded for enquete in the sum of \$1,500 bail each.

Judge Proulx was given to understand by detectives that counterfeiting of Canadian currency was going on so extensively that the Dominion was flooded with spurious money of the 50 cent denomination. The counterfeit money is judged to be \$7.5 per cent silver, showing a small profit on each piece struck off.

ITALY TO SEND MINERS TO DIG COAL IN RUHR

Press Demands Participation To Secure Reparations Due From Germany.

Rome, March 12.—Italy may send her own miners to dig coal reparations out of the Ruhr.

It points out that Italy would be justified in mining at least that portion of Ruhr coal due her under allied agreement.

The Italian press generally supports the idea, which is believed to have been put out by the government as a feeler of popular sentiment.

MAN CONVICTED OF MURDER DECIDES ON HUNGER STRIKE

Nicola Sacco Starts Twenty-Fourth Day Without Eating Food—Declares He Is Innocent of Dual Slaying—Does Not Care To Live.

KENT POLICE HOLD WALTER ANDERSON

Former St. Thomas Manager Charged With Misdeed Committed in Dresden.

REMAINED FOR WEEK

Claimed Accused Secured Loan For His Company On False Pretenses.

Chatham, March 12.—Walter C. Anderson, former head of the Provincial Machine & Supply Co. at St. Thomas, is being held by the county authorities for a swindle alleged to have been perpetrated following the establishment of a branch plant in the town of Dresden. Anderson, who was arrested by the Toronto police, was brought to this city Friday night by Chief Campbell of Dresden, and was formally arraigned before Magistrate Carscallen in county police court Saturday. He was remanded for one week. He may be released if bail of \$5,000 is put up on his behalf.

The particular charge on which Anderson was arrested is one of false pretenses. It is alleged that on the 10th of February, 1922, one M. J. Jeffs of Dresden, a shareholder in the branch plant established in Dresden, backed the company's note for \$2,000 on a loan secured from W. O. Weise.

It further alleged that defendant represented that the company was worth \$60,000 and that there were no encumbrances against it. Last summer the company made an assignment to its creditors.

CLINTON TRIMS SARNIA W.O.S.S.A. SEMI-FINAL

Winners Earn Right to Play Off Against Woodstock—Simcoe Woodstock.

Clinton High School at noon today defeated the Sarnia Collegiate hockey team, 6-2, in a postponed W. O. S. S. A. semi-final, and earned the right to meet the winner of the Woodstock-Simcoe clash in a final series for the title. The Woodstock-Simcoe game has been ordered for either tonight or Monday night at Paris, and it is altogether likely that the W. O. S. S. A. championship will be decided before the end of the week.

RULES UNION ILLEGAL, CANNOT SUE MEMBERS

Justice Galt At Winnipeg Gives Decision in Engineers' Case.

Ottawa, March 12.—The decision of Mr. Justice Galt at Winnipeg that the International Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers as an "illegal organization" cannot sue its members in the courts has not created surprise in labor circles here.

It is stated in high labor circles here that the case is the result of a dispute between the International Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and a Canadian association of engineers which recently seceded from the parent body. S. T. Starr, who was the president in the case, secretary of the Canadian association.

The decision is not regarded as likely to cause much trouble to the union, as it is not looked upon as controlling the general situation. It is said that a Montreal court recently gave a decision pointing in the other direction.

Doubt is expressed here whether Mr. Galt held the "International Brotherhood of Engineers to be 'illegal' or merely 'non-legal'."

The distinction is regarded as important in labor circles.

OWEN SOUND MAN HURT AT WORK HOISTING LOGS

WOMEN CAN NO MORE KILL WITH IMPUNITY

American Juries Determine They Must Pay for Crimes of Passion.

New York, March 12.—Women can no longer "get away with murder." American juries have determined that women must pay for crimes of passion. These are the opinions of Ferdinand Pecora, assistant district attorney of New York, famed as one of the most astute and aggressive prosecutors in the city.

Discussing the sudden turn in the tide which swept Mrs. Lillian Raison and Mrs. Paulette Saunders into prison for murdering men, following a long list of acquittals of women who killed husbands and sweethearts, Pecora said today that the sentiment which says slayers have heretofore been regarded as rapidly disappearing.

He believes this is due to the increase in these crimes, and to the greater freedom now given women. Time was when a bullet from a woman's revolver would take a man's life, and the shooter was charged with the same time. Any man shot by a woman was pre-supposed to be a rotter, worthy of quick death. But now, says Pecora, all that has changed.

"Men who serve on juries now are looking upon women with the same dispassionate eyes as upon prisoners of the own sex," he said in an interview.

"The Raison and Saunders case indicate an entire change in the masculine attitude. This change is based on two things, first, a clear recognition by men of feminine emancipation; second, the alarming growth of crimes of passion in which women were accused."

IMMIGRATION SCHEME MAY BE SUPERSEDED

Ontario May Have to Give Way to Dominion in Dealing With Britain.

London, March 10.—Though Ontario was the first Canadian authority to arrange schemes under the overseas settlement act, it may find most of its plans superseded by Dominion arrangements, which Deputy Minister Black of the Dominion department of immigration is making. He is coming to negotiate an agreement with the overseas settlement commission, and will arrive here Monday.

Part of the Ontario scheme, dealing with unmarried adults, is in operation, and the first batch of immigrants sail next week. But schemes for settling families and boys are held up by the Ontario government will not meet the settlement committee's requirements. The committee offers to pay half the cost of the boys' houses for agricultural settlers, if Ontario will clear an understanding that these houses will be used by immigrants and not the general public.

Regarding boy settlers, the committee requires that supervisors should be appointed in the first instance by the federal government, though afterwards they will be entirely under Ontario control. On both these points, the province and the committee failed to agree at an agreement. The committee would prefer to make an agreement with the Dominion rather than with the province, as it is possible that delay in completing the provincial scheme will result in its supersession.

150 PERISH IN SINKING OF GREEK TRANSPORT

Vessel Is Caught in Terrible Storm Between Salamis and Piraeus.

Athens, March 12.—The Greek transport Alexander capsized and foundered Saturday with a loss of 150 lives. The vessel was caught in a fierce storm between Salamis and Piraeus.

The transport had on board 250 officers and men, on furlough from the Greek cruisers Georgio Savaroff and Lemnos. During the voyage a fierce gale was encountered. Three huge waves struck the Alexander, which turned over. An explosion of her boilers followed and the ship foundered. A smaller vessel, which preceded the Alexander, successfully weathered the storm.

When the Alexander capsized many craft hastened to the rescue, but a majority on board the transport were lost, owing to the smaller vessels being unable to get through the high seas. There were heart-rending scenes at the admiralty pier throughout Saturday night, where crews were watching the bringings ashore of bodies which had been picked up. An official today announced that the casualties numbered 150, among whom were two naval officers.
