HOOF-MOUTH DISEASE BREAKING OUT AGAIN

English Cattle Raisers Greatly Concerned Over Recurrence of Malady.

Associated Press Despatch. London, Oct. 22.—Cattle raisers are worried over a recurrence of the foot and mouth disease at several places in England. Scarcely had the minister of agriculture's withdrawal of the last restriction dealing with the disease been announced when an isolated outbreak was reported. Since then there have been several others. The reports have come from scattered districts.

Yesterday there were no arrivals from foreign ports. Under the restrictions any sheep or cattle coming in must be immediately slaughtered.

The fox hunters also are much concerned over the fresh outbreak, as hunting is not allowed in the affected areas, since horses and dogs crossing low pastures are likely to carry the infection away with them. All hunting in Cheshire has been forbidden. If the disease extends to Leicestershire, where the Prince of Wales contemplates hunting shortly, this sport will be stopped.

Vast Audience Thrilled As Blind Organist Plays

Dr. Hollins, World-Famous Composer, Sways Crowd With Beautiful Compositions.

IMPROVISES THEME

World famous as an organist and composer, Dr. Alfred Hollins of Edinburgh found St. Paul's Cathedral packed last night for his recital, the first of the Western Ontario concert series, which is being given under the management of Harry T. Dickinson.

When the first lovely notes of the Mendelssohn Sonata No. 1 fell upon the ears of the audience, there was a hush of expectancy. And from this number throughout the entire program, with its amazingly beautiful improvisation and compositions by the artist himself, the audience was filled with an ever-increasing wonder at the genius of the man.

He has sometimes been called the wizard of the organ. Those who heard him last night would not doubt the correctness of any such name. From his fingers and from his toes sprang magical music. Oftenest his playing is quiet and restrained. But in the color passages in his descriptive numbers and in his improvisation he lets himself go. The whole church swells with beautiful music which seems almost heavenly in its conception and interpretation.

Dr. Hollins is famed as much for his improvisations as his own musical creations and interpretations. His is the musical genius alone which enables him to improvise so exquisitely on a theme which is entirely new to him.

Improvises Theme.

Last night he was given a theme by Dr. L. Balogh of St. Peter's Cathedral. After it had been played but twice, the artist of the evening was ready to improvise. With amazing skill did he work with this new found story, so that it grew and grew into a beautiful musical structure. Perhaps, to an audience unaccustomed to improvisations of such amazing beauty, this number was the favorite of the evening. It was difficult, however, to gauge the feeling of those who must refrain from applause because they were in the cathedral. And Dr. Hollins' own

Old Sol Suffers Flock of Spots

Washington, Oct. 22.—Magnetic storms on the earth may be expected as a result of the flock of sun-spots now visible on the sun, and the needles of compasses on the earth may be affected, causing trouble in navigation, according to J. A. Fleming, of the department of terrestrial magnetism of the Carnegie Institution of Washington.

These spots are now visible on the telescope used to display the sun. According to attendants this is the largest number of sun-spots seen at one time since the sun passed through its period of minimum activity about two years ago. The largest of the 17 visible spots is about 20,000 miles across.

Dedicated to Dr. Ernest Macmillan of Toronto, at one time his pupil, it seems to have a special interest for Canada.

Dr. Hollins' interpretations of Bach, Cesar Franck, Mendelssohn and Nesbitt can only be described as the work of a master musician, of one who comes so closely into sympathy with the men themselves that he cannot help but play their works acceptably. The Cesar Franck Prelude, Fugue and Variation, and Bach's Toccata in F were brilliantly rendered.

Nesbitt's Pastoral "On the Moor" was handled with loving care by Dr. Hollins. As he played, one seemed to feel the "Scent of pine and purple heather. Crested hillocks wild and free. The lark's sweet song, the whaup's weird cry."

And the distant croonin' of the sea." These are the lines which the composer has prefixed to this piece. And they were caught up by Dr. Hollins into beautiful music.

REDUCTION OF SENATE IS ELLIOTT'S SOLUTION

W. Middlesex Conservative Would Also Cut Salaries by \$1,000.

Parkhill, Oct. 22.—An elective senate, half the size of the present body, and with salaries reduced by \$1,000 was the solution offered tonight by Wm. Elliott, Conservative candidate in West Middlesex, when he discussed the question of senate reform.

Hon. George S. Henry, minister of public works in Ontario, was the principal speaker at the rally held here tonight. He advocated a high protective tariff, and urged that there should be a reduction in the expenditures of the dominion.

The third speaker of the evening was George A. Elliott, M.L.A. for North Middlesex. W. H. Bortram, president of the local Conservative organization, was chairman. The meeting was held in the town hall, and was attended by about 300 people.

WELL-KNOWN STOCKMAN DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Galt, Oct. 22.—John Brown, 73, one of the best-known stockmen in Ontario, died this morning after an illness of eighteen months. At one time he was one of the largest shippers of cattle from Canada to the United Kingdom, but in recent years had devoted his attention principally as an exhibitor, the stock of John Brown and Sons being prominent at all big shows.

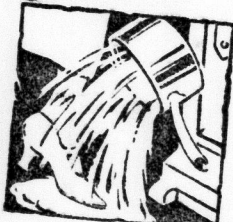

PREMIER'S CHALLENGE GOES UNQUESTIONED

Shows Clearly That Tariff Reductions Has Not Injured Single Industry.

Canadian Press Despatch. Brantford, Oct. 22.—Brantford people today are all talking about the great speech given last night here by Premier King. The point of his address most talked about was his direct challenge to any one in the audience who could show that the tariff reductions made by the present government had injured a single industry in this city. After making the challenge the prime minister paused a few seconds so that there was ample opportunity for an acceptance, but not a voice was raised.

The effect of the address removes some of the misapprehension regarding protection, which the premier showed clearly is not the cure-all, and if pushed to extremes would kill the very industries it is supposed to help. Brantford has, without doubt, improved industrially in the last two or three years. W. G. Raymond, local member, came in for much praise by other speakers during the evening. His own short address was quite typical with its invincible logic, moderate tone and cheerful strain. The audience was probably half Conservative. There were many present from Brant county, and word is being received here that the Progressive, E. H. Standing, will defeat F. Smoke, the Conservative in the county.

FIVE RAILROADS INVOLVED IN BIG RUM-RUNNING CASE

Chicago Has Biggest Prohibition Suit in History on Its Hands. Associated Press Despatch. Chicago, Oct. 22.—Indictments will be asked against five railroad corporations by the district attorney in the biggest prohibition prosecution ever started here, it was disclosed today.

The district attorney also expects to proceed against some 50 individuals and several eastern breweries. The investigation resulted from a shipment of beer from the east to Morton Grove, a suburb of Chicago.

ONE DEAD AND ONE DYING AFTER WORCESTER CRASH

Worcester, Mass., Oct. 22.—Peter McGuigan, 66 years old, native of Charlottetown, P. E. I., was killed near here this morning when his automobile in which he was riding with a number of friends, grazed a tree, struck a telephone pole, snapping it off close to the ground, and then turned turtle on the main highway to Boston. One of McGuigan's friends is dying of his injuries, while two others were treated in hospital for severe lacerations and bruises.
