

PLAINTIFFS WIN IN THREE CASES AT OWEN SOUND

Five Thousand Dollars Awarded For Death of Woman Under Wall.

ASSIZES ARE CLOSED

Owen Sound, Oct. 30.—Assize Simon, an Owen Sound fruit dealer, today was awarded the sum of \$5,000 and costs, in his action for \$20,000 damages, against the Kibbourn Real Estate Company, for the death of his wife, Julia Simon, who was killed on March 11, 1922, when a high brick wall on the defendant's property collapsed and buried her under the debris.

The verdict was brought in today after jury had spent an hour in deliberation. Mr. Justice Lennox granted the request of counsel for the defendants for fifteen days' stay of judgment.

R. L. Brackin, K.C., of Chatham, acted for the plaintiff, while R. T. Towson, K.C., of Toronto, appeared for the defendant company.

In his address to the jury Justice Lennox emphasized the fact that action concerned only financial loss to husband and that sentimental considerations should be eliminated. The defendants had admitted liability.

LONDON SOCIETY ORGANIZES FIGHT AGAINST UNION

Presbyterian Church Association Holds Meeting and Discusses Action.

Monday evening at the home of J. A. McLandress a meeting of the London branch of the Presbyterian Church Association was held. President Donald MacAlpine occupying the chair.

Rev. James MacKay gave a full report on the meeting of the Dominion executive of the association, recently held in Toronto, dwelling particularly on the legal committee's report on the proposed enabling bill.

Reports were also read from Rev. W. F. McConnell, M.A., Dominion organizer, on his itinerary in the Lower Provinces, and from Rev. J. W. MacNamara, B.D., Dominion secretary, on the situation which is developing throughout the whole country. Both reports were singularly encouraging and would indicate that Presbyterians are bestirring themselves and that it is to be no easy matter to drive them out of the church of their fathers.

One interesting item in the report on the West was to the effect that at a meeting of the Synod of Alberta held recently, an amendment was made to the motion, that members of the synod be appointed to the council to the United Church of Canada, and was defeated by only four votes, the vote being 32 to 28, and when a protest and dissent were drawn up and presented 31 members of the synod signed it.

The local executive found it hard to see how this vote could be made to coincide with Dr. C. Gordon's statement that "The West is unanimous for union." In their judgment this vote, together with the fact that a strong union propaganda committee, which includes Dr. Pidgeon of Toronto is touring the West, go to show that the West is anything but solid for union.

Select Committees.
After listening to the different reports the following committees with their conveners were appointed:

Literature committee, convener, A. S. Miller, London; public meetings committee, convener, Donald MacAlpine; publicity committee, Rev. James MacKay, B.D., convener; finance committee, J. A. MacLan-
dres, convener.

The literature committee was instructed to seek a key man in every congregation of the presbytery, that through him the literature of the association might be placed in every home.

It was also moved and agreed to that the executive meet regularly on the third Monday of each month.

The following resolution was also drawn up and unanimously adopted: "Whereas the Presbyterian Church Association desires cordial unity with all churches, and co-operation in furthering the cause of God and the welfare of humanity. And whereas they consistently believe that to this end a nation of free churches in sympathy co-operation would be more effective and harmonious than an imperious national church. And whereas the doctrinal basis was clarified by purging and changing and adding to two former creeds, a good faith to its unity, its order, its expression, and to the claim that it expresses the faith of the negotiating churches. And whereas this destroys the spirituality of the session, the autonomy of the congregation in the call of their minister, and the efficiency and control of the presbytery, and would create a centralized bureaucracy within the church.

And whereas the Assembly at the beginning made solemn covenant with the people that the union would not be consummated without the consent of the entire membership, but lately has accepted the advice of its corporation lawyer to force the issue through by securing legislation and the lobby of the legislators rather than by securing the assent of the people and a bill the most indifferent to the trusts of our fathers and the rights of individual consciences that ever was attempted.

Requested Deeds.
And whereas the union committee some time ago requested congregations to hand over to them all deeds of property held by them for their own interests, and have since withdrawn the request and because among other reasons that congregations are not going to part with their deeds until the matter is finally decided. And whereas the union committee under cover of creating interest in the mission work of the church is carrying on a rigorous campaign in behalf of church union.

And whereas the minimum stipend is unsettling ministers and disturbing the peace of congregations, and the coercive method of the General Assembly in seeking to force congregations into union without their consent has divided every congregation into two parties and creates the church with serious disruption, we therefore commend the liberties wherewith Christ made us free.

2. To oppose in every legitimate way the obliteration of our beloved church and rally loyally to its support.

3. To become informed on all matters pertaining to the principles and liberties that are ours and to seek to interest others.

4. To group the noble ideals of a co-operation of free and independent churches, stimulating each other, and assisting in the great cause of God.

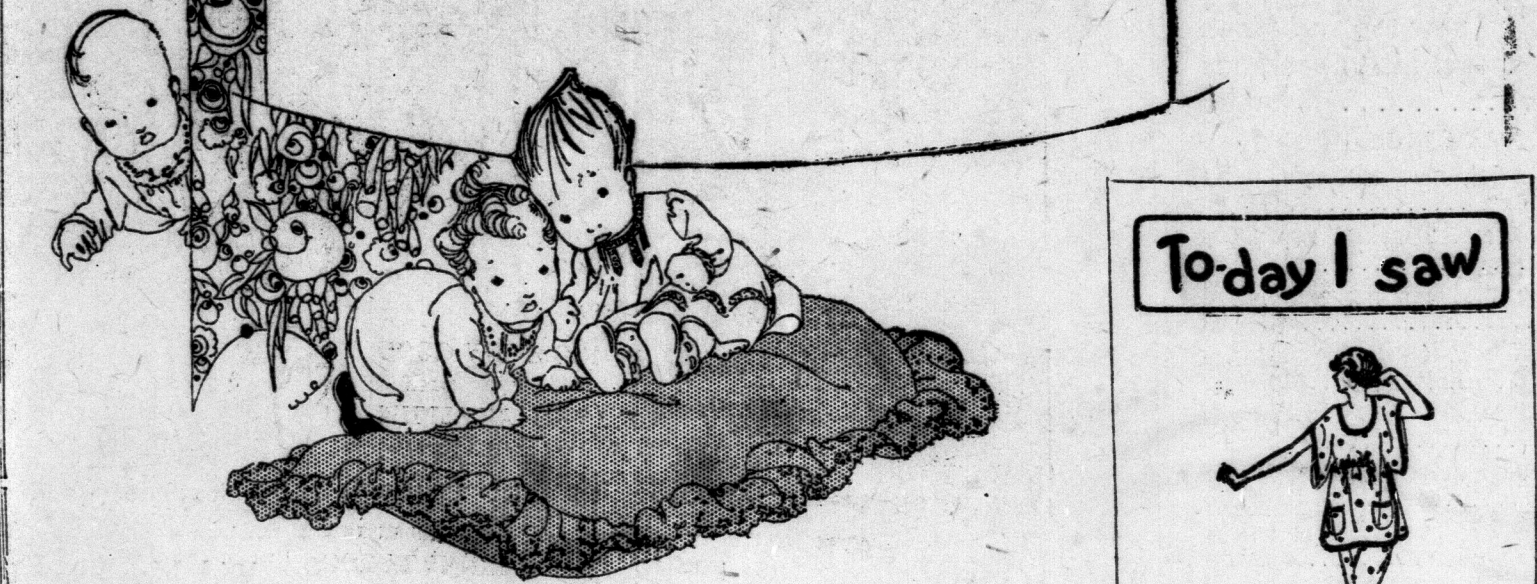
5. To stand fast, that those who seek to coerce us to accept their tyrannous bill will themselves be forced to change it, and grant us the liberties and rights that are ours.

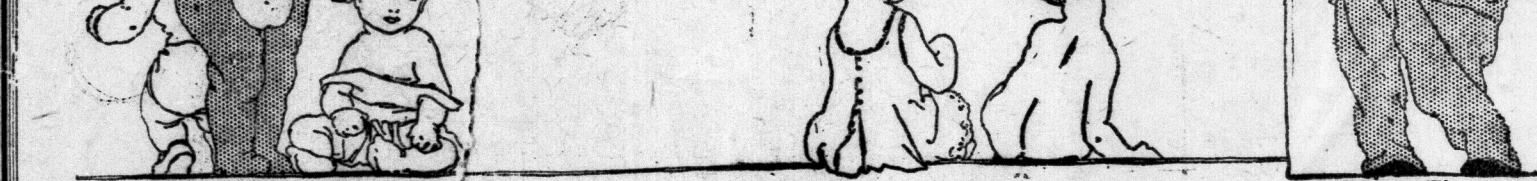
