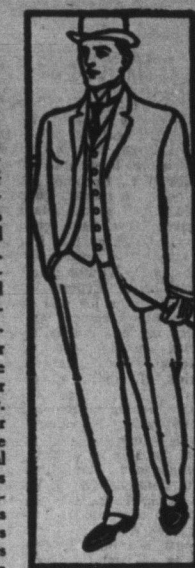

THE OPEN SEASON.

It is interesting to sportsmen to
note at this season of the year that
except under the authority of a li-
cense no person not residing and
domiciled in the Province of Ontario
shall angle in the waters of the pro-
vince. Sturgeon may not be caught
or killed, except under authority of
a license. The same rule applies to
the taking of fish or spawn for re-
creational purposes. Fishing is pro-
hibited in Lake Nipigon and River
Nipigon.

The open season for deer, moose,
reindeer or caribou extends from No-
vember 1 to November 16; for
grouse, pheasants, prairie fowl,
partridge, or woodcock the season is
between September 15 and December
31; for black and gray squirrels,
wild turkeys from November 1 to
December 1; for swans and geese
from September 15 to April 30;
ducks and other waterfowl, from
Sept. 1 to Dec. 31; for snipe, rail,
lover, or other shore birds, Sept.
1 to Dec. 15; hares, from Oct. 1 to
Dec. 31.

Moose, reindeer and caribou are
protected north of the main line of
the Canadian Pacific Railway ex-
cept between Oct. 16 and Nov. 15.

WELLESLEY'S LIVE BOARD OF TRADE.

A regular general meeting of the
Wellesley Board of Trade was held
in the Annex on Monday evening
last, the president presiding. There
were in attendance Messrs. C. F.

Saunders, Clegghorn, Schaub, Free-
born, Hammond, A. E. Reiner.
The President gave an outline of
the work done by the council since
meeting, then called upon the vari-
ous committees to report progress.

Incorporation.—The committee had
investigated and found that the vil-
lage could conduct its own municipal
business at a slight saving upon the
present system. Information was ob-
tained through Dr. Lackner, M.P.P.,
as to legal steps necessary to incor-
porate.

Fire Protection.—For this commit-
tee Mr. Clegghorn reported that esti-
mates were at hand for a water pow-
er system and also for a hand engine.
An effort was recently made to buy a
hook-and-ladder outfit, but no con-
clusion was reached.

Railway.—Mr. Green gave a brief
history of the negotiations with the
Grand Trunk Railway Co. re the
branch from Baden, and that we are
now awaiting the decision which the
Company is to give when the engi-
ner's report is before them.

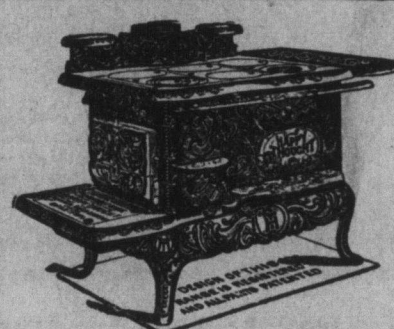
