3. Were the terms mentioned in the defendant's letter of 18th January, 1892. intended to be a modification of the written instructions of the 18th September. 1890, and were they so treated by both parties? "Yes."

4. Were these terms accepted and acted upon by the plaintiff as the complete contract between them? "No."
5. If not, did the defendant verbally authorize the plaintiff to do his best (or same as question 2)? "Yes."
