WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any mail over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and culivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owne and occupied by him or by his fat he mother, son, daughter, brother

In certain districts a homesteader In certain districts a homesteader ood standing may pre-empt a quarter-ection alongside his homestead rice \$3.00 per acre, Duties, —Must re de upen the homestead or pre-emp on six months in each of six years om date of homestead eintry (includ-ing the time required to carn home-ead patent and cultivate fifty acres

A nomesteader who has exhausted is homestead right and cannot obtain pie-emption may enter for a purhased honestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reide six months in each of three years, ultivate fitty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
