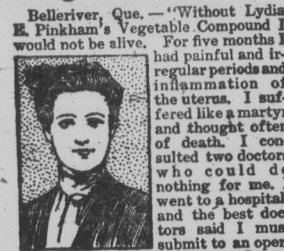

RELIEF COMMITTEE

ISSUES STATEMENT

OF AFFAIRS.

Copy of Auditor's Report.

The books of the Relief Committee have been returned from the Auditor-General who in his report says:—

In accordance with the appointment by the Lieutenant Governor in Council, I have made an audit of the accounts of your Finance Committee and beg to hand you herewith a certified statement of same.

RECEIPTS—The total amount of cash subscriptions was \$184,233.24. The sale of cottages brought \$7590.00. Miscellaneous receipts amounted to \$435.25. The interest credited by the banks was \$1182.13. So that the total cash received was \$196,440.62, and the same was deposited in the banks doing business in Campbellton.

DISBURSEMENTS—The sum of \$70,000.00, contributed by the Dominion Government was handed over to the corporation of the town of Campbellton, to be used solely for the purpose of paying the interest on the bonded debt of the town at the time of the fire. For general relief purposes, the sum of \$114,166.77 was expended, so that the total disbursement amounted to \$184,166.77, leaving a balance of \$9243.85 unexpended.

23. That within the limits of district No. 1 no shack or temporary building of any kind shall be built, erected, reconstructed, remodelled, placed, or moved from district No. 2 or 3 into district No. 1, and all such shacks or temporary buildings heretofore constructed and now being in said district No. 1 shall be removed on or before 31st DAY OF DECEMBER, A. D. 1911, provided that in the case of contractors and other persons actually engaged upon the construction of a permanent building within said district No. 1, they may be allowed to erect a shack or temporary building for the purpose of storing tools, supplies and material required in such construction, said temporary building to be removed when said permanent building is completed.
