LARGE FEES TO TREASURY

North Shore Lumber Firms Make Big Payments to Province.

The largest contributor to the Provincial Treasury through the Crown Lands is The Richards Manufacturing Company, of Campbellton, which pays \$160,000. The Bathurst Lumber Company, of Bathurst, is second, paying \$155,000.

Other large payments are made as follows: Shives Lumber Company, Campbellton, \$97,000; J. B. Snowball Company, Limited, Chatham, \$74,000; Fraser Companies, Limited, Edmundston, \$65,000.

IMPORTANCE OF CANADA'S FORESTS

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—How closely the forests of Canada are related to the prosperity and security of the British Empire was clearly emphasized at the Imperial Forestry Conference just concluded in London, Eng., according to Hudson Black, of Ottawa, who represented the Dominion. One of the chief conclusions of the entire conference was that the empire's forest resources and those of Canada in particular were very inadequately known.


An inventory of the forest resources was agreed upon. The next Imperial forestry conference is also to be held in Canada in 1928, an event which will bring to this country distinguished representatives from all parts of the empire. The British government has adopted an aggressive policy of forest planting, and Mr. Black, that the Canadian forest cannot be fully appreciated until it is seen in the light of the world's forest resources.

PROV. RIFLE ASSO. MEET.
The forty-seventh annual prize meeting of the New Brunswick Provincial Rifle Association opened at Sussex August 10th. The weather was fine and shooting conditions only fair. The attendance is much smaller than in previous years. The entire morning was taken up in practice with the new Enfield rifle, which some of the men had never used before.

FEVER SITUATION.
The typhoid fever situation in the vicinity of Bathurst which has been under investigation all summer improves but slowly. There have been about 150 cases, mostly in West Bathurst, and of the number fifteen patients or ten per cent, have died. The latest deaths were those of Mrs. Fred A. Dunn, formerly Miss Edna O'Brien, of Bathurst, aged twenty-four, and Joseph T. Daigle, of West Bathurst, aged sixty-five. While Mrs. Dunn lay critically ill her husband, who was in Boston, left for home, but was too late to find his young wife alive.

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
