A \$50 PRIZE LETTER

Stable work, with its consumption of time and its clinging odors, so distasteful to a professional man, has been entirely eliminated for me by my car.

My car has frequently saved railway expenses by enabling several delegates to attend church conventions in various places at a cost equal to railway fare for one. Further, it eliminates the inconvenience of travel.

As my parish extends over fifty square miles, my car affords me great assistance in making pastoral calls. It enables me to give pleasure to invalids and others by taking them on my trips.

It carries me to assist in Life's great scenes, as recent events prove:—A Christening, eleven miles away. A wedding, seven miles away. A funeral, to a cemetery thirteen miles distant. Sick calls, nine miles from home.

It enables me to conduct services and give lectures in places where there are no railway connections. It also means cheaper and more enjoyable holiday trips for the family.

Truly my car is a boon and a blessing to me.


