cause of death. Mr. Cameron was of Scottish descent and was born in the Township of Warwick, just on the outskirts of Watford, on September 16th, 1854. He lived his entire life in this com munity and had been a business man here for many years. He first conducted a house furnishing business and undertaking parlor, then later gave this up to purchase a livery stable, which he conducted for a number of years; but seven years ago he took over the grocery business formerly conducted by his brother Alex, and had engaged in that business ever since. In religion he was a Presbyterian and in politics

He married Miss Mary, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Marshall, of Warwick township, who survives him. Besides his widow he leaves two daughters, Mrs. Alexander D. Elliot, of Watford, and Miss Lottie M., a member of the teaching staff of the local public school. He is also survived by one brother, Alex-Cameron of Leamington and two sisters, Mrs. David Ross of Warwick township and Miss Jessie Cameron of

Warwick Lad is Given a Chance to Start Right Robert A. Auld, Pleading Guilty to Auto Theft, Gets Suspended Sentence

With the consent of the crown prosecutor, magistrate C. S. Wood-row suspended sentence on Robert A. Auld, 21, Warwick Township, who pleaded guilty in the county police court Monday afternoon to a charge of the theft of an automobile from the garage of Ray Morningstar Watford, on June 22. The suspension was conditioned upon the payment of costs, restitution to the garage owner for any damages incurred and in addition the youth and his father, William Auld, went on a joint recognizance in the sum of \$500 for the former's future good

WARWICK BOY IN TORONTO OFFERS BLOOD TO SAVE CHILD

James Jones, 4th Line, Has Proper Blood Rating, so Immediately Offers His Blood for Transfusion

(Toronto Globe)

Although only three or four per cent. of Toronto's population, according to official estimates, have blood which is rated in No. 4 group apparently the little minority who are so classified have their full share or more of generosity, practical charity and courage.

A blood transfusion is necessary to save the life of four-year-old Victor Coughlin, who lies in the Hospital for Sick Children, severely scalded after falling into a pail of boiling water. The blood to be used must be of No. 4 group, the same as the child's own. Out of a host of applicants, five, one of them a young lady, were to-day discovered to have the same grade of blood. The transfusion operation is being performed this afternoon. The five volunteers who have been accepted are: Lyman A.
