As to results, the people listened well, admitted that we had something that they knew nothing about, but cash is their great barrier, and our prayer is that many who have heard the word may have courage to confess Christ before all.

There is much of both joy and sorrow in the work, joy in telling the story, and sorrow that it is heeded so lightly. Dear Sisters, let us unite in our prayers for these women and all others that are in like darkness on this mission field, their name is legion.

Our Home Mission Finances

Are not as they should be. Up to date we have received \$283.00 this year, which is more than \$100.00 less than last year at the same date. When we met in Berwick last August, the delegates from the Aid Societies voted that we raise the following sums this year for Home Missions, viz:
