New Windows in St Mary's Church

The Very Reverted Administrator of the Archideose, Father McCann, has long had in contemplation the matter of beautifying the face parish church of St. Mary's with undows of stained glass. The first step in the undertaking has just been accomplished and the people having soon the result are warm in their expressions of admiration. The large and gracefully cut Gothic window in the south transper now presents a striking picture of the Crucifixion. The Gurra of the Saviour hanging on the striking picture of the Crucifixion.
