## ECCLESIASTICAL NOTES.

Tas Bishop of Liverpool will retarn to his diocese about the middle of Ootober.

Thi Rav. T. Luoias Morgan, formerly minis ter of the English. Presbyterian Churoh at Boanmaris, has been presented to the reotory of Lydbam, Salop.

This latest intelligence from Australia in re. ference to the health of Bishop Selwyd, of Melanesia, although more hopefal, deolares that the Bishop is still seriously ill.

Thi eloquentBishop of Darry, Dr. Alezander, has accopted the invitation of the trastees of Columbia College to deliver a sories of lectures on "The Eividences of Christianity," in Now York, next Lent.

The Archbishop of York has appointed the Right Rev. Bishop BIant to bo Bishop Saffragsn of Hull, in the Diocere of York ; and has also confirmed the commisaion granted by the late Arohbishop Thomson to the Bishop of Beverleg.
Ar the Churoh of St. Mary at-Hill, Fiastohesp, Ingland, whioh is famed for its exquisite oak carving and its organ, a course of morning and evoning Sundey leolnres is announced to be given by clerical members of the staff of the Charoh Army.

Tar Arohbishop of Canterbary is said to be deeply convinced of the atility and practioability of an immense extension of the episcopal order, and the reasonable probability that suffragan bishoprios will eventrally settlo down apon a permanent territorial footing.

The Biahop of Salisbury lately made a walking tour through the Dorsatahire part of his diccese. He was accompanied by a number of boya from the Bishop's Sohool, to whom his Lordship opened his past, atore of information upon the nataral beanties and antiquities of the places visiled.

Ten sixth annaal, convention of the Brother. hood of St. Andrew will be held in St. Lopis, Mo., Ootober 22, 23, 24 25, 1891. The preliminary arrangements are progreasing rapidly. The basiness meetings and conferences will be held in the Exposition Hall. The pablio services will be held in different oharohes through. ont the city.

Thy Rev. Canon Newbolt condnoted a party of about sixty mon of theartisan clabs, members of the Holborn Satarday League, over St, Paul's Cathedral lately, and spent s considerable amount of time in desoribing the varions monaments ard ornaments to the visitors. Among other items of informstion it was mentioned that the original cost of building was $1,500,000 l$.

Tas Bishop of Ripon eays in the New Reviev that the modern development of prasching eppeara to have a large admixtare of the flapor of advertisement, and suggest the deuperation which clatohes at a chesp and shallow saccess
(in a bad sense, ) a popular servioe, instead of the calm earnestness whioh seeks to benefit the people and the Charoh of God.'

Cardinal Manning says of bapaars and other anoh popalar methods of raising money for religions parposes, that he is dead againat them and has always bean againat them. 'It seoms to me,' he writes, 'that our Lord's work oughti to be done in our Lord's way, that is, for His sake, and with the purest motive. Anything of self or of the world mixing in so far destroys the parity of motive, and, as St. Paul says of oharity, may reduce it to nothing.'

Ir is estimated by Dr. Cbarles A. Briggs that by denominational consolidation in Elaglish apasking lands, nearly 100,000 miniaters of the Gospel woald be rolebsed from their present daty, and rendered available for the evangelization of heathen people, and that nearly $\$ 100$, 000,000 would be set free for their support. Christianity is to-day offered to the Japanese, through the agenog of twenty-three diffecent Churoh orgenizstions or denominations.

Me. Gladstone, in his groat spoooh st the Colonial Bishopries meoting on Jane 19 ih, at St. James' Hall. incidentally mado some re. marks whioh cover the whole prinoiple for Which the Bishop of Cincoln contende. He oharacterized it as "an historioal, a legal, and a philosonhical cariosity" that any one ahould have treated the Privy Connoil as a binding anthority in questions of faith and doctrine, or disoipline relating to faith and dootrine. To say that was, he declared, equivalent to asying that 'the Aposiles' and Nioeno Oreed are vory imperfect, sad there ought to be added to them a separate article to say that all men, to be good Christians, mast be bound, at any rato in the Charoh of England, to aocepl whatever sanses may be affized to either of these oroeds by the civil tribunals of the coantry."
$\triangle$ bmiden of the revenaes of the Charoh in England has just boon pablishod, and it shows a gross income of $5,753,537 l$., of whioh nearls five and a half millionsaroderived from ancient endowments, and something under $300,000 l$ a pesp from prizgte bepofagicag nin 3 , 1723. Daring the last sixty years the namber of bene. fices has increased by 3,200, and the income of the new livings is nearly $1,000,000$. The five and three quarter millions represont the gross income of the Oharoh, and take no acoonnt of rates, taxes, paymonts to Quoen Anne's Bjunty, dilapidations, stipends of ourstos, voluntary contribations to Carroh sohools, and the handred and one other wajs whio' havo beon devised for ridding the olergy of their oash. It would be a moderate entimate to say that 20 per cent, of this money goes amay in payments which cannot be resiated. This leaves four millions and a half, whioh, divided amongst the 23,000 olergy of the Charoh of England, gives an average inoome of not quite 200l. a year apiece.

Bripg Thembon, who has for five fears
 Bitioh ohaplaincies of North and Central Harope, ppoals for sid in raising an endowpont fand lor what may be called his 'diocese.' The ferrifory in whioh he ministers episoopsilly to British tourists and British residents is eight Eimes the size of Great Britain. It inoludes ten nations, and extends from the cland of the midnight sun' to the Prrences, and from Calais to giberia. The Bishop says, in a letter to the Times, thiat laat jear he trapelled and worked throngh 13,000 miles to look after these Continental Britons, and whon he comes to Eingland, instead of being able to reat, he has to move up and down trying to interest Charohfolk in his work and to add to the ondowment fund, for whioh he has mansged in five jears to colleot aboat 56,000 withoat aid from any society. The travelling Americans, who almost everyWhere on the continent use the British oharohes, Jet contribute little to this fand, doabtless be. csace they know little of its need. The Bishop
