which pervades all classes of society in England at the prospect of approaching war as may be seen by the following extract of a letter recent-ly written from London: "It is no longer denied, even by the most sceptical, that any mo-ment may bring to England a formal declaration of war; and in view of the imminence of the anger it is gratifying to see with what cooless, moderation and absence of mock heroics, the people accepted the necessity and prepare o meet it. For some brief time it is considered probable that the war may be carried on from the ordinary resources of the country, without the imposition of any new impost. so powerful an enemy as Russia it is impossible to carry on a little war, and the nation is fully aware that a war tax and a new loan must be submitted to. Judging from the present temper of the people, and the generally healthy tone of all departments of trade, there would seem to be no doubt of her meeting all the exgencies of the case on favorable terms. The ccredited agents of government no longer hesitate to speak of the approaching war. The captains appointed to raise the volunteer coast efence are making the tour of all the ports and hing towns, calling on the maritime popula-on to enrol in defence of their country against the Russians."
