EXPORT CONTROL LIST

Question No. 39—Mr. Martin (Essex East):

1. Have any items been placed by the governor in council on the export control list (order-in-council P.C. 1958-1158 and subsequent amendments thereto) for the purpose of ensuring that arms, ammunition, implements or munitions of war, naval, army or air stores or any articles deemed capable of being converted thereto or made useful in the production thereof or otherwise having a strategic nature or value will not be made available to any destination wherein their use might be detrimental to the security of Canada?
2. If so, which items have been so placed on the export control list?

Hon. George H. Hees (Minister of Trade and Commerce): Mr. Speaker, the answer to No. 1 is yes. The answer to No. 2 is, all items in groups 1 to 8 inclusive except the following: pancreas glands of cattle and calves, pork and pork products, swine of that breed known as Lacombe swine, logs of all species (of wood), pulpwood of all species (of wood), scrap iron and steel, used rails and used railway axles, and helium gas.
