Mr. Martin (Essex East)*—On Monday next—ADDRESS—(No. 6)—For a copy of all correspondence exchanged between the Government of Canada and the Government of the United States, regarding the diversion of Great Lakes waters, since July 1, 1959.

Mr. Fisher*—On Monday next—ORDER OF THE HOUSE—(No. 7)—For a copy of all correspondence, papers, investigation reports, and other documents, in connection with threats or reports of threats against officials relating to the operation of the Jacques Cartier bridge.

Mr. Winkler—On Monday next—The following proposed Resolution:— That, in the opinion of this House, the government should consider the advisability of standardising the dates of beginning and terminating daylight saving time in the six time zones of this country.

Mr. Carter—On Monday next—The following proposed Resolution:— That, in the opinion of this House, the government should give urgent consideration to the provision of some means whereby low interest loans may be made available to small business.
