

The new union station is to have a reception hall for incoming passengers eight feet high. Mayor Church believes this will be one of the wonders of the world. All the architects agree with him. But the mud wall had to be considered and the mud wall would not permit of anything higher than an eight feet celling. Consequently Toronto is to have the most remarkable union station in the world. Meaning of the War




