NATIONAL CHARACTER.

This open door policy is of the utmost importance from the point of view of cluzenship, because it means that students of various denominations, who are all one in one common nationality, can now enjoy the close intimacy of the social life of residential colleges, in an institution where religion is given its proper place and weight, without the undesirable segregation of different denominations in separate colleges during the formative period of their lives, when they ought to be coming into the closest possible touch with all classes of the community, and growing into sympathy with all tho component elements of the State.

THE MACKENZIE BURSARIES FOR PRESBYTERIANS.

The great bunefits to be derived from University residence under such conditions prompted Mr. William Mackenzie (a Preshyterian) to donate ten Entrance Bursaries, of the value of \$100 each, to be enjoyed by Presbyterian students proceeding to the B.A. degree in Residence in Trinity College. These bursaries will be open to award in October, 1903.

OTHER NEW BURSARIES AND SCHOLARSHIPS.

A number of special bursaries have also been established lately for Church of England students, several of which are in tho nature of loans to be repaid by the student in small instalmonts after he has taken his degree. There are also other new bursaries and scholarships open to all denominations, among which are the Leonard MeLaughlin Scholarship and the Trinity—U.C.C. Scholarship (worth \$100 and \$250 respectively) open only to students of Upper Canada College; others open to all the Residential Boys' Schools in Ontario; and others again open to students (of both sexes) in the Collegiate Institutes and High Schools of the Province. All these have been established by different friends of the University with a view to bringing the altogether exceptional advantages which Trinity, as a Residential University, offers to the youth of Canada, within the reach of s
