

extend as far as possible the blessings of education, the Committee have become embarrassed in their operations, and sundry claims remain unliquidated—to meet which, as well as to complete several repairs indispensably necessary to the Buildings, and provide new Schol apparatus, all of which have been recommended so as to ensure the continuance of the Grant from the Province in aid of the Salaries of the Teachers,—Your Committee recommend that an appeal be forthwith made to the friends of Education and the general public, for such support as will enable them to maintain in all its integrity, this Institution—believing it at the same time to be a duty incumbent upon every well-wisher of the rising generation to assist them in the acquisition of knowledge, secular and sacred, thereby elevating the mind and causing it to rise superior to mere sensual indulgence—nor do they entertain any doubt that this appeal will be met in that spirit of benevolence and philanthropy for which this community has heretofore been characterized
