Traders Sell Wheat on Bulges And Grain Market Sags Heavily

Prices at Chicago Drop Off Again Under Profit-Taking Movement—
Argentine Crop Conditions Reported Generally Poor.

Cables say that rain has fallen in the Province of Cordoba in southern part and also light showers in the Province of Buenos Ayres. The corn crop shows a bad outlook.
A Buenos Ayres cable from Broomhall's agent in Buenos Ayres states that the rains in the north have been insufficient and that practically no rain has fallen in the Province of Buenos Ayres. Buenos Ayres future market: June corn on the curb shows an advance of 1/4c from yesterday's closing.

Argentine cables: Rains have been very beneficial in the east part of Buenos Ayres Province, and in the South Atlantic Province, all over Cordoba. Slight rain has fallen in the greater part of the central portion of Argentina.
India Shipments.
India—Shipments, 1,024,000 bushels, against 760,000 last week and 2,000,000 last year. Broomhall estimates the shipments for next week from Karachi at 420,000 bushels. The agent at Bombay states that there have been fairly heavy rains and this is causing some anxiety.

LIVERPOOL, Jan. 12.—The market at LIVERPOOL showed a firm undertone with values 1/4 higher. Offerings were lighter and shorts covered part of the area, and with a firm undertone. American and Canadian firm. There was some demand from continent and some buying from local sources. With a firm undertone and rather more firmly held. The quality of cattle was common to medium, with a few loads of good to choice.
Trade was good, but not as brisk for cattle as on the other two days of the week, that is, it took longer to make a deal, but prices were no lower.
There has been a good steady trade for cattle all week, commencing with Monday, and unchanged through Thursday.
Prices have been firm and all offerings readily taken at the prices bid for.
George Hayward bought for the Harris Abattoir Co., 250 cattle at following prices: Steers and heifers, \$5.50 to \$6.50; cows, \$5.00 to \$5.50; bulls, \$5.00 to \$5.50.
Stocks and Feeders.
Harry Murby, who is again on deck at the market, reports few offerings for hogs, but they were well taken after. Murby, Mayne & Wilson sold 10 loads of hogs, good to choice, at \$7.35 to \$7.50; common to medium at \$7.35 to \$7.50.

BARON SWAYTHLING DEAD
Took Great Interest in Jewish Institutions and Building Synagogues.
LONDON, Jan. 12.—Baron Swaythling, the banker, died here to-day.
Montagu Samuel Montagu, the first Baron Swaythling, was born Dec. 21, 1840, and was the son of the late Louis Samuel, a watchmaker of Liverpool.
For over 50 years he conducted business in London, and until his death, he was head of the banking firm of Samuel Montagu & Co. In 1894 he was granted a royal license to assume the surname of Samuel-Montagu, and created a baronet, and in 1907 he was created a Viscount Swaythling of Swaythling. The baron took a great interest in advancing Jewish and other institutions and in founding new synagogues.

New York and Chicago Publishers
After Ontario Pulp Mills.
Sturgeon Falls Pulp and Sulphite Mills will be sold by auction. Liquidator E. R. C. Clarkson has been appointed to sell the property. W. R. Horst, the Ontario newspaper publisher, and two Chicago syndicates have been seeking offers.
The mills have been operated by the liquidator a time.
A meeting of the shareholders was held yesterday in London, England, to authorize the sale of the property by auction. The mills and the concessions have an estimated value of \$1,250,000.

TO SIGN BOUNDARY TREATY.
LONDON, Jan. 12.—J. P. O'Connell, Liberal member for London, and diplomat agent to France, left to-day for Paris, where he has been authorized to sign the boundary treaty between France and Liberia. This treaty was negotiated in 1907, and its consummation was made recently a condition upon which France would assist the American project for the re-establishment of the finances of Liberia.

SIR T. BROCKLEBANK DEAD.
PITTSBURGH, Jan. 12.—Cable despatches to this city announce the death in Liverpool to-day of Sir Thomas Brocklebank, baronet, father of Mrs. Geo. Westinghouse, Jr., of this city. He was 63 years old, and was made a baronet by Queen Victoria. He leaves a widow and three sons and three daughters.

Chicago Cattle.
J. P. Bickell & Co., say at the close: Wheat—Lower. After an early bulge, due to higher cables, profit taking caused a decline, values losing 1/4 to 1/2 c for the day. Situation unchanged from a supply and demand standpoint. Bull leaders in contract market, but weaker than our own. Minneapolis wired that there was a better demand for wheat to arrive, and also reported an unusually large number of country elevators in North Dakota closed on account of the short crop in that country. There was no demand for our milling customers advised us that supplies were much more readily obtainable and at lower prices at points nearer home.
