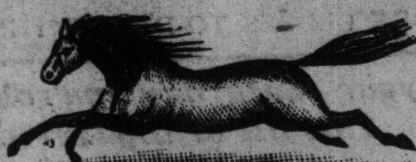

AERONAUT CARRIED TO SEA.

Picked Up, 12 Miles in Ocean, After
200 Miles' Trip.

Boston, July 6.—After one of the most
remarkable experiences in the history
of aerial navigation, James K. Allen,
the aeronaut, who made a balloon as-
cension at Providence on Wednesday,
was brought to this port to-night on
the fishing schooner Francis V. Sylvia.
Allen was picked up at sea 12 miles
off Chatham at 7.30 o'clock yesterday
morning, 18 1/2 hours after his depart-
ure from Providence. The Allen is
alive to-night, is due wholly to a
fortunate shift of the wind.

During his flight Allen covered a total
distance of about 200 miles, nearly all
of which was on the water. The point
where he was picked up is about 75
miles from Providence in a straight
line.

SENATE BILL DEFEATED.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson's View of Grand
River Proposals.

Ottawa, July 6.—(Special).—During
the hour for private bills to-night the
house in committee defeated the sen-
ate bill to incorporate the Grand
River and Western Power Company.
W. F. Maclean (South York) oppos-
ed the bill vigorously. It was opposed
by the farmers thru whose lands the
canal would be built, and it would di-
vert the waters of Lake Erie and de-
plete the feeder of the Welland Canal
itself.

Mr. Emmerson said the bill threat-
ened the public works of the coun-
try.

W. F. Maclean (South York): "Then
defeat it and take the responsibility."

Mr. Lancaster (Lincoln and Niagara)
also opposed the bill.

Mr. Boyce (West Algoma) was quite
indignant and said that the govern-
ment was discriminating against this
particular enterprise.
