CONTINUES TO DEPTH.

London Journal's Correspondent Says Ore Bodies Go Deep. The Investors' Guardian of London Eng., under date of Oct. 12, says: Our special correspondent now in Canada-a gentleman who is familiar with mining fields in other parts of the world—has recently investigated the position at Cobalt in special reference to these two queries, and he gives most reassuring evidence on both points. The immediate richness of the ore is beyond question, but mining engineers and geologists held the opinion that the ore was confined to the "lower Huronian conglomerate," and that it would go no deeper—hence, that it was shallow.
