FATTENED CHICKENS.

Ottawa, Dec. 30.—Several large shipments of chickens, fattened especially for the British market, have been sold on the other side at good prices. The Agriculture Department has been so advised. One consignment of 24 cases, shipped to Liverpool from Hillside, P. E. Island, netted the owner 14 cents per pound, or about 22 cents per chicken.

ARTIST STAVES TO DEATH.

London, Dec. 30.—The Evening News this afternoon prints the following despatch from Belfast: "A well-known Scottish artist, John Fairman, died of starvation here on Christmas night. His body was found in miserably squalid surroundings."

REPRISALS ARCH. CAMPBELL

Parkdale Prohibitionists Denounce His Flop on Temperance Question at Eglinton Meeting.

THE BETRAYAL OF HIS PROMISES

Men Who Have Been Working for Him Are Now Urging His Defeat.

Parkdale Royal Templars held a special meeting on Saturday night at MacMath's Hall, when the chief matter of discussion was Mr. Campbell's repudiation of his promise to abstain from liquor. It was pointed out that a committee of highly respected electors, composed of three Conservatives and two Liberals, two of them holding the chief offices in the Royal Templar order in the province, had given a unanimous written report of an interview in which Mr. Campbell had promised to abstain from liquor. It was pointed out that the Ontario Alliance for the total suppression of the liquor traffic desired in the matter of amendments to the Scott Act, and that in the face of their unanimous statement Mr. Campbell was now urging the contrary.

Other gentlemen spoke in strong terms in condemnation of Mr. Campbell's "volte face." Several who had been working hard for Mr. Campbell announced their intention of voting their utmost efforts from now until the election to defeat him in consequence of his public betrayal of the temperance cause. A definite action will be taken at a Royal Templar meeting to be held this evening at MacMath's Hall, at which Past Grand Counsellor Buchanan will report upon Mr. Campbell's course at the Eglinton meeting. Select Councilor Gallagher presided.

SEES TROUBLE AHEAD.

Agent of Bible Society Predicts an Uplifted in China.

New York, Dec. 30.—Charles F. Gammon, superintendent of collectors for the American Bible Society in Northern China, writes to the society concerning the present situation in the Chinese Empire, as follows: "While at Shanghai I observed that the Chinese government was openly violating the terms of the Boxer Protocol. The great empire would shake of European domination. Thousands of boats, loaded with arms and ammunition were passing weekly up the Yang-tse-Kiang, and the arsenals were being enlarged and worked day and night.

MISISTERS STILL IN VENEZUELA.

Germany Has Not Broken Off Diplomatic Relations with Venezuela. Berlin, Dec. 30.—The German Foreign Office announces the Associated Press to announce there is no truth whatever in the despatches from Caracas, saying that the German minister has left the Venezuelan capital after a heated exchange of words with President Castro. The German Charge d'Affaires, Herr Von Pflieger-Halsbach, is still at his post, and is continuing negotiations with President Castro. There has not been any question of breaking off diplomatic relations with Venezuela. The German minister to Venezuela, Dr. O. Schmidt-Leda, who has been on a vacation here, is now on his way to Caracas. The Foreign Office again solemnly reiterates the statement that it does not contemplate territorial acquisitions in Venezuela.

Replying to Germany's utterances to the United States regarding the former's plans in connection with Venezuela, the Foreign Office here has received a message from Secretary Hay, expressing full satisfaction with Germany's position. Germany still hopes to collect her claims peacefully.

COLLIDED WITH A ROCK.

Parkersburg, W. Va., Dec. 30.—Two men are missing, one badly injured, and four cars are at the foot of an embankment, two other cars are wrecked, and a hundred feet of track torn up, as the result of the collision with a massive rock by a westbound freight train on Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, No. 3 tunnel, near Long Run, early today. The engine struck the rock, which had rolled down the hill, just as the train came out of the tunnel. The two missing men are Fireman A. H. Hill and Brakeman E. B. Putnam, both of Gratton. They probably are dead beneath the wreck. Engineer Hope Goddy of Gratton was so seriously injured he probably will die. Heavy rains loosened the rock.

FIVE CONVICTIONS.

Fruit Inspectors Working on Behalf of the Canadian Consumer.

Ottawa, Dec. 30.—The Dominion Fruit Inspectors appear to be doing work on behalf of the Canadian consumer, as well as for the export trade. They have recently secured five convictions against parties who put up apples so as to cover up inferior fruit with a layer of two of fine apples, top and bottom. There are some half-dozen other cases pending against packers in Western Ontario. In some cases, these "translucent-faced" barrels were either in warehouses or actually on cars, to be placed on board ship for export to the Old Country. In several centres, notably in Toronto, where Messrs. McKel and Schultz are stationed, dealers are being posted to their rights under the law, and encouraged to assist in prosecuting fraudulent packers.

KNOWN IN OTTAWA.

Ottawa, Dec. 30.—Mr. Coonroe J. Smith, who is well-known here, having been in Ottawa several times in connection with international customs matters, is to be appointed Assistant Secretary of the United States Treasury, in succession to General Spaulding. He is at present in charge of the United States Customs Division of the Eastern States.

VETERINARY INSPECTORS.

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 30.—The Dominion government has appointed veterinary inspectors for shipping ports between United States and Canada under a recent agreement between both countries. The official veterinarians for testing in Great Britain are J. G. Rutherford for Canada, and Geddes, United States consul's office, London, England.

Public Amusements

Daily Varden. The Lulu Glaser Comedy Opera entered upon its second week of the present engagement at the Princess Theatre last night with a large audience present. "Dolly Varden" is not only holding its own as a drawing card, but apparently gaining. Miss Glaser was in particularly good voice last night, and her "Dolly Varden" song had to be twice repeated. The other principals were up to the usual standard and the chorus was of the customary excellence. The advance sale has been very large. There will be matinees to-morrow and Saturday.

The Bill at Shea's. "The Bill at Shea's," as started in advance, one of the funniest bits of farce-comedy seen on the stage in Toronto. It is a mixture of woman's jealousy, man's good nature or peevishness, as you look at it, an old man's horse and a young woman's distress, with a baby and a kodak lens as the cause of all the trouble. There are three ladies and two gentlemen in the cast, and the whole thing is supremely ridiculous, with just enough of "topicality" to save it from the mythical. It causes roars of laughter from start to finish, and in that sense is a distinct success. The Nine Nelsons—men, boys and girls—are among the most remarkable actors I have ever seen here, and their turn was greeted with round after round of applause with their grotesque and military and dazzling costumes, and that wonderful use. They met with a warm reception. The Ballets are good in a comic act with songs and dances, and the O'Moore sisters in a high wire performance, show thrilling nerve and marvellous balancing feats. The Austins, in a juggling comedy act, open the bill, and their act is very clever and amusing. The Quaker Club Quartet is capital in a musical sense. The men are above the average as singers, the voices sounding excellently, and all being of the true quality. They are also expert players on flute, cornet, mandolin and guitar. They introduce comical dialog and a minstrel turn, with local hits, bringing in the names of P. S. Ripstone (on prohibition), and the Mayoralty candidates. The most beautiful feature of the whole bill is the musical specialty of Lillie Western, whose performance of classical selections on the xylophone and the bells wins rounds of applause. Miss Western also gives a snare drum exhibition, showing marvellous expertness in handling the sticks. The audience yesterday were among the largest first-day gatherings of the season.

At the Toronto.

"The Convict's Daughter," produced at the Toronto last evening, is a thrilling and dramatic action. The play deals with the ups and downs of an escaped convict, who, happy and attempting to reform, falls into the hands of a scheming villain. The latter forces his victim to present himself as the father of the daughter of a banker. Posing in his attempts to gain the girl's hand, he betrays his tool's secret. Back he goes to prison but escapes, and as usual, the villain meets with his reverse, and the ex-convict is reinstated with his good name. Mr. Maurice Drew's interpretation of the leading character, the convict, was very clever. He had a scope for comedy and tragedy, which he filled equally well. Editha, the convict's daughter, was ably portrayed by Miss Marie Fable. A. Weller received the usual amount of hisses accorded the villain, while Frederick Lander received much applause in his character of Jack Warburton. The rest of the cast is strong, the scenery good and the show altogether well worthy of being seen.

Mantell in Richard III.

The Grand Opera House packed to the roof with the reception Toronto tendered Robert B. Mantell last evening in his recitation of Shakespeare's tragedy in six acts, "Richard III." The best of the principal repertoire of classic plays which N. W. Hanley will present this week at the theatre. Mr. Mantell grows better each time he visits the city, and promises to give the record engagement of the season. In his preparation of classical characters he is unusually pre-eminently a strong, free and versatile interpreter, and his handsome appearance and polished art have placed him in the first rank of American tragedians. The tragedy of "Richard III," which he recently staged, the scenery is elaborate and the costumes superb, while historically correct. The climax reached in the last act is particularly fine, and the duel between King Richard and Earl Richmond is intensely realistic. The cast of characters is magnificent and the talent good, particularly Miss Marie Booth Russell. Mr. Mantell's repertoire for the week will be as follows: Monday and Wednesday nights, "Richard III.," Tuesday night, "Hamlet," Wednesday (holiday) matinee, "Play of Lyons," Thursday and Friday nights, "Cardinal Richelieu," Saturday matinee, "Roméo and Juliet," Saturday night, "Othello."

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
